

### REDMOND UNION HIGH SCHOOL MAY DISSOLVE

Election on Question to Be Held on June 19—Districts in Union Are Dissatisfied.

(Crook County Journal.)

An election has been ordered for the various school districts which are embraced in the boundaries of the Union High School District No. 1, which is commonly known as the Redmond High School, on June 19, for the purpose of voting on the dissolution of the district. This district was created some months ago, and includes eleven districts, reaching into the Powell Butte, Terrebonne and Sisters countries.

The creation of the district brought out considerable strife, and no doubt the dissolution campaign will be contested both for and against, in a spirited manner.

Some of the districts contend that they are tributary to Prineville and think the county institution enough, while others take the other view.

Up to this time all property holders have paid taxes for the support of both high schools.

The territory affected lies in districts 54, 7, 49, 36, 60, 32, 59.

### JAMES M. KYLE

Umatilla County Candidate For Nomination as Public Service Commissioner.

"Encourage capital; regulate if it should become oppressive," is the comprehensive slogan of James M. Kyle, Umatilla county's candidate for the nomination for commissioner of the public service commission. Commenting on this slogan, E. E. Brodie, president of the Oregon State Editorial Association, says: "The State of Oregon, and the eastern part particularly, always has been and now is suffering for the want of capital to develop its manifold resources, particularly in the line of irrigation and railway construction.

"Heretofore there has been too much of a tendency in Oregon to antagonize money, especially such as has been invested in corporations of various kinds. Mr. Kyle is in favor of inviting money to come here for all legitimate enterprises, but at the same time stands ready to properly regulate the same under the law, should it in any manner become oppressive.

"The general co-operation of all interests along the line advocated by Mr. Kyle will lead to great development in this state, and he is entitled to the thanks of the people for being a pioneer in announcing a broad gauged policy such as this."

Mr. Kyle has the distinction of being the only candidate for the office from the territory west of the Blue mountains. He is essentially a home candidate having lived here and been interested in this section for many years. He advances his thorough acquaintance with eastern Oregon, his experience in the shipping business, and his 25 years active participation in the development of the varied resources of the country as the principal reasons why he should receive the support of local people.—Adv.p

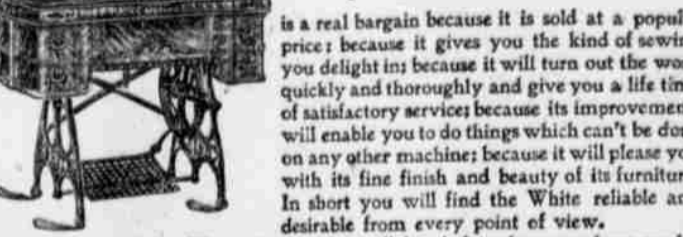
