Lots of Mail.
Last week the local post office received 11,640 pounds of parcel post and 72 sacks of first class and second class mail in one day. This makes a total of 31,135 pounds of parcel post that has arrived in Burns on parcel post wagons, besides several hundred pounds that arrived on regular stages daily.—Harney County Tribune.

Paisley Wants School.
At a meeting of the school board held last week they unanimously decided to submit to the people the proposition of bonding this school district in the sum of \$39,000 for the purpose of providing adequate school facilities here. Notice of the election will be published at once and it will be held June 19.—Chewaucan Press.

Klamath Feels Hurt.
Klamath County will be without a representative in the lower house of the Oregon legislature for the next two years unless the democrats succeed in electing their candidate, both Forbes and Burdick being residents of Crook county. Our district which comprises five counties has but two representatives and Crook county with the aid of Grant and Jefferson selected both Crook county men. Now the democratic nominee comes out with the announcement that he will advocate a division of the district. Under the existing condition he should be able to gain enough republican votes in Lake and Klamath counties to elect him.—Crescent News.

Many Voters Sworn In.
Less than half of the total registered voters of the county voted at the primaries. Complete returns show about 2,000 votes cast and of these 429 were sworn in, making the actual registered vote less than one half. Of the 429 sworn voters 348 were republicans and 81 democrats. There were 85 ladies who voted in this list. The largest number of those sworn in came from Bend, numbering 141; Prineville was next with 44; Powell Butte 33; Post 30; Deschutes 21; Redmond 18 and the rest scattering.—Crook County Journal.

Valuable Rock Found.
A ledge of olivine and eclogite was discovered last week by Engineer Riddell. The deposit is of considerable commercial value as a building stone and is the only known deposit of its kind in Central Oregon. The Chamber of Commerce building in Portland is built of the same material. The natural cement-like qualities of the stone classes it among the best materials for crushed rock road construction.—La Pine Inter-Mountain.

Much Rain Falls.
Postmaster Green, who has charge of the U. S. Government weather bureau at Cliff said the rainfall for the last week ending May 27 was .67 of an inch.—Fort Rock Times.

RABBIT BOUNTY.
(Oregon Farmer.)
R. A. Ward, biological assistant at Redmond, is inclined to look with disfavor on the rabbit bounty as a means of eradicating the pest. He writes that in Harney county that for the year 1915 a bounty of 50 cents was paid for rabbits. In the year bounties were paid on 952,526 rabbits, amounting to \$47,626.35. The number of rabbits was materially reduced, but the heavy drain on county funds will make it necessary to withdraw the bounty offer and all the rabbits are not dead. Those remaining will soon bring the numbers back to as high as ever. He believes this method is far too costly and not permanent. The proportion of benefit is not great enough to justify such a bounty, and he opposes it in Crook county. Some other method of destroying the pests must be used.
