POTATO GROWERS MEET

Next Regular Quarterly Meeting to Be Held July 10th.
The Deschutes Valley Potato Grower's Association held a special meeting in the county agriculturist's office at Redmond on Monday for the purpose of studying the work and business of the association during the marketing period and to make plans for the summer.
This association was organized late in the winter and only 10 growers have sold potatoes through this medium. Notwithstanding its late start and the few potatoes it has handled, it has guaranteed grade and quality, received good prices, given the buyers satisfaction and received offers of a blanket contract for its entire output this season. Four carloads of potatoes sold through the association have netted the growers over \$1600. The value of grading potatoes for shipment has been definitely proven. Members of this association will this year grow a large acreage of potatoes for seed purposes, using hill selection and keeping their fields free from disease. They have asked for an inspector to assist in keeping potato diseases from gaining any foothold in this section.
Messrs. Lovett, Hunt and Mustard were appointed as a committee to formulate rules and regulations for the handling of potatoes by the association and for government of responsibility of growers and members to the association. This committee will report at the next regular quarterly meeting which will be held at Redmond on July 10th.
