

# LOCAL SCHOOL ELECTION HELD

## J. P. KEYES IS CHOSEN DIRECTOR

Succeeds J. N. Hunter—D. M. Davis Becomes Clerk for Coming Year—Meeting Discusses Buildings and Sites—Options are Listed.

J. P. Keyes was elected a member of the local school board, and D. M. Davis, clerk, at the election on Monday. Mr. Keyes succeeds J. N. Hunter, who has been a member of the board for the past three years. Mr. Davis succeeds H. J. Overturf, clerk of the District 12 board since 1912. Although neither candidate was opposed by any other nominee, Mr. Overturf declining a nomination for re-election, George S. Young's name was written in for clerk by a number of voters. The final vote stood: Davis 26, Young 17. Mr. Keyes received 45 votes. In all 48 ballots were cast, or more than a third less than in last year's election.

The meeting was called for 10 o'clock and at that hour 18 voters were present, but no member of the school board. At 10:21, after being telephoned for, Director Smith and Clerk Overturf appeared. The meeting was called to order soon after and at 11:34 Director Larson came in. Director Hunter did not attend the meeting.

In addition to the election of officers the meeting heard a summary of the financial report for the year

and engaged in a wandering discussion of school sites and buildings. This was started by a statement by Mr. Smith as to building sites optioned by the board.

These include a block in Westoria owned by L. D. West, the remainder of the block on which the high school building stands, owned by The Bend Co., and others, the water tower block and a block near the Tumalo bridge in Park addition, owned by The Bend Co. No property has been optioned on the west side of the river.

Of the new officials, Mr. Keyes is general manager of the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Co., and formerly secretary of The Bend Co. Mr. Davis is in the insurance business.

Posters calling on the voters to elect J. P. Keyes, director and Geo. S. Young, clerk, and signed "Bend Ladies Committee Mrs. H. K. Brooks, Mrs. T. A. McCann and others," were circulated on Saturday and Sunday but so far as could be learned none of the committee attended the meeting.

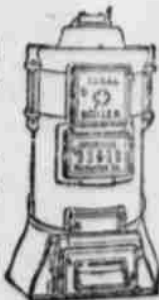
