KOON IN EVERETT.

R. E. Koon, who was the engineer in charge of the construction of the Bend sewer system in 1913 and 1914 has just taken charge of the engineering work in connection with the construction of the new municipal water supply for Everett, Washington. According to letters received from Mr. Koon by friends in Bend, the work will cost about \$400,000 and will consist of the building of a dam and 28 inch pipe line from a point on the Sultan river to the city, a distance of 26 miles over a rough wooded country.
