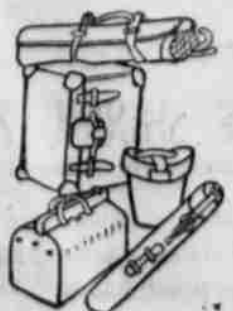
DIVORCE IS GRANTED.
