

# BROWN CHOOSES BALLOT TITLES

## ATTY. GENERAL PREPARES STATEMENT

Eight State Wide Measures to Be Voted on at Fall Election—Official Title Contains Gist of Law—Differs From Framers.

Designation of the official titles of the various measures which will go on the ballot at the election next November, with a brief statement of the purposes of the proposed amendments and by laws, has been completed by Attorney-General Brown and they will be filed with Secretary of State Olcott tomorrow.

There are eight statewide measures to go on the ballot and under the law the statement containing the gist of each measure must contain not more than 100 words. In many cases the official title decided upon by the Attorney-General, who is authorized by law to say what shall go on the ballot, is far different from the title originally proposed by the framers of a measure.

**Titles Are Chosen.**  
As the eight state wide measures will appear on the ballot, the titles chosen are as follows:

**Rural Credits Amendment.** Purpose—To bond the state for not over 2 per cent of assessed valuation of all property therein for "Rural Credits Fund." Bonds from \$25 to \$1000 in series of \$50,000, maturing in not over 36 years, interest 4 per cent, exempt from taxes. State to loan said fund to owners occupying farm lands, on mortgages not over half land value nor \$50 per acre, nor less than \$200 nor more than \$5000 to one person, small loans preferred. Loans made for: (a) payment for land; (b) purchasing livestock and equipment and making improvements; (c) satisfying incumbrances incurred for such purposes; interest 5 per cent.

**Brewery Bill Labeled.**  
Amendment "permitting manufacture and regulated sale 4 per cent malt liquors." Purpose—to amend section 36, article 1, Oregon constitution, which prohibits manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor, by permitting the manufacture of fermented malt liquors containing four per cent or less of alcohol, for shipment outside of this state and for sale and delivery within the state by the manufacturer in original packages only, in quantities and under regulations which may be provided by law. Until otherwise provided such sales within the state shall be limited to the same quantity as may be imported, but the same persons cannot within any one period fixed by law, both import and buy locally.

**Prohibition amendment** forbidding importation of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes: Purpose—This is a constitutional amendment extending the existing constitutional provision, relating to the prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor, by also prohibiting the importation of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes.

**Tax Limit Measure Listed.**  
"Statewide tax and indebtedness limitation amendment: Purpose—Limiting tax levies of state, county, municipality or other taxing power to not more than the total amount levied the last preceding year, plus 6 per centum thereof, except for paying bonded indebtedness and interest thereon, or by vote of the people, any increase so voted excluded in determining subsequent tax; limiting power to counties to incur indebtedness to \$5000, either voluntarily or when imposed by law, except to suppress insurrection or repel invasion, or not over 2 per cent of assessed valuation for permanent roads on vote of people; and invalidating debt, payments and taxes exceeding such limitations.

**Bill repealing and abolishing the Sunday-closing law:** Purpose—To repeal section 2135 of Lord's Oregon Laws, which prohibits the keeping open of any store, shop, grocery, bowling alley, billiard room or tipping house, for the purpose of labor or traffic, or any place of amusement on Sunday or the Lord's day, excepting theatres, drug stores, doctor shops, undertakers, livery stables, butchers and bakers, under penalty of a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50.

**Rental Tax Explained.**  
"Full Rental Value Land Tax and Homeowner's Loan Fund Amendment: Purpose—A constitutional amendment declaring and defining (a) people's power and right; (b) citizen's right to use of land; (c) public ownership of land rent; (d) public policy of Oregon; defining (e) the word "land"; (f) method of appraising land rent; (g) land improvement; providing for (h) levy of permanent land rent tax; (i) publication of assessment; (j) delinquent tax sale; (k) maintenance of private property rights; (l) separate assessment of land rent; (m) standing timber; (n) assessment and collection of tax; (o) duty of Governor and State Land Board; (p) how personal property and land improvements may be taxed by vote of the people only; (q) distribution of revenue from land rent tax; (r) establishing homeowner's loan fund."

**Amendment "For Pendleton Normal School and ratifying location of certain State Institutions:** Purpose—To provide for locating a state Normal School at Pendleton, Oregon, up

on a site to be donated therefor, appropriating \$125,000 for buildings and equipment and levying an annual tax of one twenty-fifth of a mill on all property in the state for its maintenance, and ratifying the location of certain state institutions heretofore located away from the State Capital."  
**Anti-Compulsory Vaccination Bill:** Purpose—To prohibit compulsory vaccination, inoculation and other such treatment for the prevention or cure of contagious diseases, and providing a penalty therefor.

## ROUND-UP DATES SET

Pendleton Affair to Take Place on September 21, 22 and 23.

**PENDLETON, July 25.**—With conditions practically insuring an attendance in excess of the great crowds of 1912 and 1913 when 75,000 people witnessed the exhibition the Board of directors has dated the Seventh Annual Round-Up for September 21, 22 and 23, and made preparation for increased seating capacity in the bleachers and the greatest exhibition ever staged. The railroads have increased the territory included in the Round-Up special rates so that this year they will extend as far as Salt Lake on the Union Pacific; Missoula, Mont., on the Northern Pacific and south to San Francisco and north to British Columbia.

The fact that the Round-Up is the biggest and practically the only attraction of national interest on the Pacific Coast this fall has caused the eastern and transcontinental lines to advertise it extensively and use it as a basis for western tourist business. This will bring many additional thousands to the annual frontier show.

The show itself will be superior to anything heretofore staged. More and better bucking horses than ever will be up for the riders, the relay races will have not less than ten strings of four horses each and there will be more competitors from all over the west in the steer roping and bulldogging.

More than a thousand applications for ticket reservations have been received which is the biggest number ever received at this season for any one of the former Round-Ups. Many noted people of national fame contemplate being present, of which Secretary of Treasury McAdoo has already assured the Round-Up that he will be present.

## TO HOLD EXAMINATION

Civil Service Commission Would Obtain List For Clerkship.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission announces that a forest and field clerk examination will be held in this city on August 19, 1916, to fill vacancies as they may occur in the Forest and Reclamation services. The usual entrance salary is \$1100 to \$1200 per annum. It is possible that vacancies in the Reclamation Service may also be filled from this examination at \$900 and \$1000 per annum.

Applications will not be accepted from persons who do not show that they have had at least one year's actual experience in clerical work in a business office. A knowledge of stenography, typewriting and book-keeping is required.

Both men and women will be admitted to this examination, but men only, between the ages of 18 and 40 years, will be employed as forest clerks. The age limits are 18 years or over on the day of examination.

Persons who desire to enter the examination should apply to the Local Secretary, Board of Civil Service Examiners, at the postoffice, this city.
