

# SETTLERS WIN SECOND ROUND

## NEW HEARING DATES ARE SET

Judge Galloway Dismisses C. O. I. Co. Petition For Writ of Prohibition—Company Has 60 Days in Which to Appeal—Case Unique

The second round of their contest with the Central Oregon Irrigation Company was won by the settlers last week when Judge Galloway, in Salem, refused to make permanent the injunction previously issued prohibiting the Public Service Commission from proceeding with its hearing and investigation of the company affairs. The commission has now set August 21, 22 and 23 as dates for the hearing.

No written opinion accompanied Judge Galloway's decree dismissing the company petition for the writ of prohibition, but it is understood that his decision was based on the legal proposition that the Public Service Commission was a co-ordinate branch of the state government with the courts and therefore should not be interfered with by them.

### Action Begun Last Fall.

Action against the company was first brought by the settlers in the fall of 1915 by a petition to the commission asking that it take charge of the distribution of water and the expenditure of maintenance fees on the project. A date for hearing had been set, when the company sought a writ of prohibition from the Supreme court thereby causing a postponement.

In June the court decided that it had no jurisdiction of the case and dismissed it, whereupon a new hearing was set, only to be postponed again by the proceedings in Judge Galloway's court. It is understood that the company now has 60 days within which it may appeal from this latest decision.

The case is unusual in being the first in which a Carey act company is sought to be regulated by a state public service commission.
