

# SHEVLIN-HIXON WON GAME 5-1

## TETHEROW FANNED 20 MILLITES

Bend, Considerably Weakened in the Infield, Registers 10 Errors. Knutsen Struck out 12 Men and Allowed Three Scattered Hits.

Tetherow fanned 20 men, allowed only five hits, permitted only seven men to get on bases, but that was not strong enough base ball to permit Bend to take Sunday's game and the Shevlin-Hixon also won, five to one. Ten errors chalked up against Bend are largely responsible for the unrelenting defeat, four of which were registered against Clow, playing short stop.

Tetherow was the first man to bat for Bend, got a three bouncer and scored. That was all the scoring Bend did.

Knutsen, in the box for the Shevlin-Hixon side did not do so badly himself. He struck out 12 men and allowed only three hits in the game. No more than five men faced him in any one inning.

Bend was, however, considerably weakened in the infield, and to this fact the large number of errors is chiefly attributed.

The Shevlin-Hixon first score came in the second inning, when Baker sent first on Steidl's error, second on Steidl's error, third on Clow's error and came home on McKay's error. The mill team scored three in the fourth inning. Both Houston and White went first on Clow's error and scored, and Baker came in on Hezelle's single. Knutsen scored in the ninth when he stole home.

## BURNS VOTES BIG BOND IN AID OF RAILROAD WORK

Harney Town Gives Big Majority for Measure—Tribune Says Railroad Is Not Remote Now.

The city election held in Burns, August 1st, for the purpose of investing the city council with power to bond the city for \$125,000 for use in constructing a railroad to this city won by a sweeping majority.

The exact vote was, 145 for and 20 against.

Burns is now in a position to do something for itself even if all other propositions fail through.

Wm. Ross was to have had a proposition in writing to the city before this election but it failed to show up, so did also Mr. Farrell's statement which he said he would give out. Mr. Strahorn's proposition could not be given out on account of not getting through with the necessary surveys which must be completed before he will know exactly what he can do for us.

The prospects now, however, are brighter for Burns than they have been for a long time and the possibility for getting a railroad into the city looks better than the first of the year are not remote by any means.

The hog market got started early and \$9.75 was reached, both for top and bulk offerings. The receipts were very light—the lightest of the season and buyers were eager for all that arrived. ### ARBOR DAY IN SPAIN.

A Custom That Was Copied From Our Tree Planting Festival.

You are prone to think, since America is the youngest of all the nations, that all our customs are derived from some older people. In whose nation life a part of our population had its source. Did you ever hear of an old European country adopting a custom that originated in the United States? When you read of the Fiesta del Arbol in Madrid you are more than likely to assume that it was the tree-planting day that gave a suggestion for our annual Arbor day.

Would you be astonished to learn that the Arbor festa was performed directly after our American festival of holiday, when trees are planted by the children of the public schools? That it was copied after our custom is not difficult to establish, for the first festival of this kind was held in Madrid in 1890, having been inaugurated by the young king and his mother. At that time we had been celebrating Arbor day in the United States for more than twelve years.

In that country the event has come to be of real significance, since it is national, whereas in our country it is under the direction of the individual states. Every year the school children are not only commanded to plant young trees, but they are taken to inspect the planting of previous years and are impressed by their teachers with the importance of conserving the forests of their native land. In his first Fiesta del Arbol address King Alfonso announced that the idea was borrowed from the United States, and it was regarded as of so much value that not even the cancer of the Spanish-American war sufficed to interfere with its observance.—St. Louis Globe Democrat.

### LUCKY GREENSTONE.

It Is Found Only in a Wonderful Mine in South Africa.

Situated in the beautiful Kaap valley, in the Jamestown district of Harberton, Transvaal, there is a mine known by the name of Verdite. The name was given to it on account of the peculiar green stone found in the mine, which is unknown in any other part of the globe. Articles of jewelry and ornaments are made of verdite, and it has been called the lucky greenstone of South Africa.

The greenstone is a silicate of manganese, of pale, colored green by nature in the course of its formation. Other silicates of manganese may be mentioned here, peridot, serpentine, mesochrom and steatite. The mine, or rather hill, consists of three varieties of tale—green, white and black.

But a peculiar fact is that in the black tale there is present pure gold. Some of the finest specimens of gold bearing rock have been found at this mine. Every one knows that gold is found in quartz, pyrites, or even sea water, but scarcely ever has it been mentioned in books that gold exists in tale.

When the verdite rock has gone through the ordinary process of crushing and the gold has been extracted the waste (or what is called the slimes of a gold mine) is used in the manufacture of soap, grease, paint, paper, toilet powders, gas jets, electric insulators, crayons and many other articles of everyday use.

In fact, one might say that everything got from this mine can be used for some commercial purpose.—Chambers' Journal.

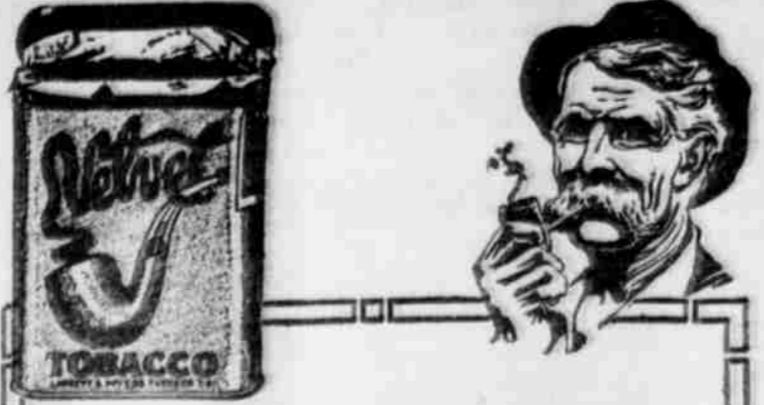

### DRAWING OFF WATER CAUSES MUCH EXCITEMENT SUNDAY

River Is Let Down Five Feet to Make Repairs on Dam—Upper Structure Is Now Being Added To.

Considerable interest and excitement was caused on Sunday when the water in the river above the power dam was lowered about five feet. Until it became known that the power company was drawing off the water to make repairs and additions on some of the under water structure of the dam all sorts of conjectures were offered in explanation. While the work was going on dozens of people lined the banks of the river studying it in its changed aspect.

Further work in this same connection which has attracted attention

this week has been that of building up on the concrete portions of the dam as a preliminary toward a possible raising of the height of the whole structure at a later date.

The company has also had a large number of men employed in extending a water main to Boulevard addition over the Kentucky street foot bridge. This has necessitated removing all of the superstructure of the bridge so that travel over it has been considerably impeded. The new pipe is being carried under the walk and will soon be in place and the walk and railings replaced.
