

### ALFALFA MILL TO BE PUT IN BY NEW BEND FLOUR MILL

Modern Method of Grinding Feed Will Be Adopted to Help Farmers Better Their Stock.

A big impetus to the stock industry will be given by the Bend Flour Mill Co., when its new alfalfa feed mill, for which arrangements are being made, is installed. To accommodate the farmers tributary to Bend with ground alfalfa feed at prices that will justify them in changing the methods of feeding, will be the plan which A. J. Kroenert, manager of the mill, will follow. Machinery of sufficient capacity to grind four tons an hour will be put in and will be in readiness for operation just as soon as the building can be erected to the north of the mill warehouses along the railroad spur.

Mr. Kroenert says that alfalfa feed is considered by stockmen as one of the best feeds now being offered. The ground feed goes farther and there is scarcely any waste. The new plant will be a big asset to the hog raising and poultry industries in this locality as well as providing another market for local alfalfa raisers.

The new grist mill is rapidly nearing completion. In the building housing this department Mr. Kroenert is planning a mixed feed mill which will prepare the latest kinds of chicken rations.

Instead of whittling away our formal statements by equivocal conversations, we needed the straight, direct and decisive representations which every diplomat and foreign office would understand. I believe that in this way we should have been spared the repeated assaults on American lives. Moreover, a firm American policy would have been strongly supported by our people and the opportunities for the development of bitter feeling would have been vastly reduced.—From Mr. Hughes' Speech of Acceptance.
