

BROOK TO BUILD

To Erect Two Story Building on Cozy Restaurant Site.

Arrangements have been completed by A. G. Brook for the immediate construction of a two story brick building on his lot at the corner of Greenwood avenue and the alley between Wall and Bond streets, occupying the present site of the Cozy Restaurant. O. G. Brubaker is the architect. A call for bids for the construction will be made at once. The building will be 50 x 60 feet in size and will be rented by Mrs. Stevenson, who will continue the Cozy Restaurant. The Cozy dining room will occupy 30 feet on Greenwood avenue, the balance of the Greenwood frontage being occupied by J. C. Smith. On the second floor will be 15 rooms.

FEDERAL AID IS ASKED.

A request to the Department of Agriculture through the State Highway Commission for federal aid in the construction of highways in government forests was made on Monday by the court which met with Hon. J. W. Rogers, supervisor of the Oregon National Forest, and W. G. Hastings, supervisor of the Deschutes National Forest. Request was made for the improvement of the road over the Mackenzie Pass to Sisters, Tumalo and Prineville to the Canyon Creek road, in the Blue Mountains; Paulina Prairie to Paulina Lake and the east side of East Lake, the road leading from the Bend-Burns road at the 21-mile post to Fort Rock and the road from Bend to Sparks Lake.

Mr. Brown says, in raising stock on a small irrigated tract. He is milking six high-grade Jersey cows which bring him monthly about \$50. Last year Mr. Brown fed 60 head of hogs on his ranch, from which he got a profit of 25 per cent. One half acre sown to peas yielded 1,200 pounds after threshing, which were sold for \$48. Mr. Brown has between eight and 10 head of hogs feeding the year around, which he butchers and finds market for in Bend.

A. J. Gonnason is one of the most recent of the settlers on the project, taking up land last year. Mr. Gonnason was formerly a bridge contractor of Seattle. He is well pleased with his purchase, and will clear his entire 40 acres as soon as possible. He now has 15 acres under cultivation of which eight acres were cleared this year. As soon as he can, Mr. Gonnason will go into stock raising and dairying.

A. Harper raises sheep. A. Harper believes that sheep raising on the project will pay any farmer who lives enough attention to it. Mr. Harper has 75 head of sheep.

He started out with 10 ewes four years ago. This last spring he obtained 14 pounds of wool per clip, which he sold in Bend for 25¢ cents per pound. Mr. Harper believes that six to eight ewes can be raised profitably on an acre of irrigated land.

Halvard Solberg, says Mr. Wallace, is of great value to the project on account of his extensive experimental work along various lines. Mr. Solberg this year is experimenting with a small patch of flax, the seed of which he obtained from Salem.

Many other farms were passed on the trip over the project, and conditions everywhere looked good. A ready market is expected for all products this year. The potato crop, it is expected, will find a market without difficulty, at prices that will be considerably above the average.

To show what can be done on an upland irrigation project Manager Fren N. Wallace will prepare a comprehensive exhibit for the State Fair to be held at Salem. There are many farmers in the Willamette Valley, says Mr. Wallace, who believe that there are certain products that can be grown only in the Willamette Valley with success. Mr. Wallace hopes to shatter this misconception.

Probably one of the biggest co-operative factors on the project is the West Side Agricultural Fair Association. It is a splendid community builder.
