Genesis of the Playhouse.

Theopis in 536 B. C. acted his plays in a wagon. In 490 B. C., during the time of Aeschylus, creator of drama, the performances took place upon temporary wooden scaffolds, one of which, having collapsed during a representation, the Athenians were induced to build the great theater of Dionysius, calling it the Lenalou, which was the first permanent stone structure of its kind. It required 100 years to erect it. There was no scenery, but the scene was decorated so as to represent the locality in which the action was going on. Roofless was his structure, but around the building were porticoes, to which the people retreated during rainstorms. Sometimes awnings were used to ward off the sun's heat.

Card Playing.

Card playing began in India in the ninth century. It was introduced into Europe by orientals some time prior to the thirteenth century. Saracens popularized the amusement in Spain and Italy. The taste for the game afterward spread to Germany, where it commenced to be indulged in about 1275. Its appearance in France was mentioned in the records of that country in 1303. ROAD IS GIVEN \$2,000 MORE

Highway Commission Puts Up Additional Funds.

(Special to The Bulletin).

Salem, Oct. 2.---At a meeting of the State Highway commission last week an addition of \$2,000 was granted for completion of the road work on the Dalles-California highway south of Bend.

H. J. Overturf of Bend, county commissioner of Crook County, appeared before the commission, explaining that with this added amount the work would be completed and full benefits could be derived from the expenditures thus far made. Mr. Overturf's request was granted after a brief discussion. The added appropriation was granted on the understanding that Crook

County next year will conduct adequate experiments in the use of cinders for road building. Previous to this time the State has appropriated \$10,000 for this Central Oregon work and the county devoted a similar amount to it.
