

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Minutes of Adjoined Meeting of the County Court September 18, 1916.

Be it remembered a regular adjourned meeting of the County Court of Crook County, Oregon, was begun and held in the County Court room in the County Court House, Prineville, Oregon, on Monday the 18th day of September 1916, the same being date to which said Court adjourned. The following officers were present: G. Springer, Judge presiding; J. F. Blanchard, Commissioner; H. J. Overturf; Warren Brown, County Clerk; E. B. Knox, Sheriff.

Thereupon the following proceedings were had to-wit: Supervisors of Deschutes and Ochoco Forests.

Applications to Secretary of Agriculture for assistance in the construction of roads under the Federal Road Act filed. See application filed in office of County Clerk. Letter of transmittal to State Highway Commission of the following roads under above application: (see copy of letter)

- 1. Ochoco-Canyon Creek Road.
- 2. China Hat Road.
- 3. Sparks Lake Road.
- 4. Newberg Crater Road.

H. J. Overturf—The Dalles-California Highway.

Verbal report of Commissioner Overturf that joint state and County funds provided for the construction of said road (D. C. 115) were exhausted. Commissioner Overturf authorized to go to Salem if deemed advisable, in an effort to get sufficient funds to complete road to end of survey, if a successful in securing state funds and Commissioner authorized to proceed to complete said Dalles California Highway to the end of the present survey provided the same does not require, to exceed \$2,000.00. The clerk is hereby authorized and instructed to draw warrants for said work upon the request of said Commissioner Overturf.

Kelley cooperate with city in selection of type of bridge and authorize county to draw warrant upon order of said Blanchard in amount equal to one-half of cost of said bridge. Costs shall be checked and O. K. by H. A. Kelley, who shall have supervision of construction.

Bend Committee (Dement, Kroner & Gould).

Commissioner Overturf instructed to make an effort to secure State the south end of the Dalles-California road that east of completion of said road and providing bridge over The Pilot Butte canal to be \$3500.

It is ordered therefore, in case state funds are not obtainable, the said Overturf be authorized to complete said work but in no case shall there be more than \$1500.00 of county money spent and this on condition that the City of Bend contribute a like sum. The Clerk is authorized and instructed to draw warrant in the above sum upon the order of said Overturf.

E. B. Knox, Sheriff Petition for correction in taxes by O. C. Gray.

Prayer of petition granted and warrant ordered drawn in favor of O. C. Gray for \$10.00.

F. T. COX. Indemnity for Tubercular cattle. Hearing on claim of F. T. Cox indemnity for three cows slaughtered under 1913 law. No objections. Proper and satisfactory proof of claim presented. Order indemnity allowed in sum of \$75.00. Order warrant in sum \$37.50. Clerk instructed to make proper application for remainder to Secretary of State.

After nearly two months the office of County Agriculturist, formerly held by Mr. Lovett is reopened again by your new agent. I have done ranch work in two counties adjoining Crook, and being a graduate of the state Agricultural College do not feel an entire stranger.

The first work of an agent in a new field is spent in a reconnaissance of the county both agriculturally, socially and economical, becoming acquainted with the people. I believe the people of Crook County are acquainted with the work of their agent. He is paid by public funds. He is your man, your servant and yours to make use of. I am not a wizard, a know-it-all nor an expert on everything agricultural, but I am your agent and I want your cooperation.

MARKET REPORT.

NORTH PORTLAND, Oct. 2.—Cattle supplies for Monday were rather liberal, over 1,600 head were received. The market was steady in most cases. Steers were sold at \$7 for tops and cows at \$5.50. Feeder demand was excellent, buyers from Oregon, Idaho, Washington and Montana being here in numbers. Butcher stock went steady at last week's prices. Hog receipts were again light, only 1,600 being in sight for the early trading Monday. Prices were steady to weaker. Ten ton was the top sale with bulk around \$9.90. Demand was fair. Sheep prices were strong in all lines and limbs showed an advance to \$8.75. Receipts were not heavy.
