Mahaffey, who is a nephew of Mrs. Mahaffey, of Bend, enlisted in the United States Marine Corps at its Portland recruiting station on May 22, 1916, and is now awaiting the call for expeditionary, sea or foreign shore duty. Marines are military men who are trained for service ashore and afloat. These versatile soldiers of the sea not only "go down to the sea in ships," but man the garrisons in our foreign possessions, and frequently are called upon to settle the disputes of our Latin-American neighbors.
