

TENANTS IN BUILDING ARE UP-TO-DATE

MERCHANTS TO HAVE FINE QUARTERS.

OFFICES EQUIPPED

Professional Men Have Modern Conveniences for Their Work-- Council Has Room on Second Floor--Splendid Theatre.

Enterprise is everywhere patent among the business and professional men, who have taken up rooms in the new O'Kane Building during the last two weeks. It has been the determination of everyone of the men whose businesses are found in this handsome structure to maintain the high standard shown in the construction of the building.

In many instances the merchants have outfitted their rooms with an entire set of new fixtures, and in some instances new stocks. Several new firms are occupying this building. The first floor with the exception of the Dream Theatre is filled by business houses. Martin & Cashman, men's furnisiers, occupy the commodious room at the corner of Bond and Oregon streets. Their rooms command an exceptionally fine view of the business center of town. Their show windows, well lighted, will be a decided attraction for the passer-by. This firm came into existence last March, with the arrival of W. H. Martin, formerly of South Bend, Washington. Mr. Martin opened on Bond street and later took A. L. Saye, also of South Bend, as a partner. In August, Maurice P. Cashman purchased the interest of Mr. Saye and since that time the firm has been known under the name of Martin & Cashman. Mr. Martin has been in the clothing business a major part of his life, is a native of Iowa, went to Seattle 16 years ago and later settled in South Bend, Wash-

ington where he successfully engaged in the men's furnishing business for six years before coming to Bend. Maurice P. Cashman, junior partner, of Irish lineage, also entered the gent's furnishing business at an early age, having been in this business in Ireland previous to his immigration to America. Shortly after coming to this country Mr. Cashman went to St. Paul and was with the general office of the Northern Pacific Railroad Co. Six years ago he came west and to Bend on a vacation. At that time the Oregon Trunk Railroad and the O.-W. R. & N. Railroad were pushing up the Deschutes River canyon. When Mr. Cashman arrived in Bend he became so impressed with the town that he remained and became identified with Hugh O'Kane which position he held until the hotel was destroyed by fire August 30, 1915.

Myron H. Symons, jeweler, hails from New York state. Mr. Symons came west at the age of 19 years and settled in Seattle, where he learned the watch repairing and jewelry business under a man of wide experience. During the Klondike rush Mr. Symons became possessed to seek a fortune in Alaska and went north a few years after the Alaskan flurry. While in the northland he was engaged in the manufacture of gold nugget jewelry. He returned two years later and opened a jewelry store near the corner of Pike street and Third avenue in Seattle where he remained until he came to Bend in June, 1915. Since his coming here Mr. Symons has built up a creditable business. Mr. Symons is watch inspector for the S. P. & S. and O.-W. R. & N. Railroads. Dr. Chas. H. Francis, optometrist and optician, is a recent arrival in

Bend coming here in May. Dr. Francis is a graduate of Trinity University, of the class of 1888, with a degree of M. D. and M. S. He became a member of the college of physicians and surgeons for the Province of Ontario and practiced medicine in Ontario for eight years, later moving to St. Hilaire, Minnesota, where he practiced for five years. For a period of a year he took post graduate work at the New Polyclinic, after which he came to Oregon. Since 1912 Dr. Francis has practiced optometry in various Oregon cities.

H. D. McBride, recently of Medford, has opened what is considered to be the finest confectionery store in Central Oregon. Mr. McBride came to Bend about three months ago to look over the prospects here and was won at first sight. He returned to Medford and packed up his large stock preparatory to moving to Bend. The new store is fitted out with handsome fixtures. Mr. McBride brought a corps of 11 assistants, who have been with him at Medford. A factory is maintained where all the confections are made under his personal supervision.

New Firm Enters Business.

Magill-Erskine, druggists, is one of the new business firms of Bend, opening up their new business a week ago in the O'Kane Building. Lloyd Magill, senior partner of the firm, is a graduate of the College of Pharmacy of Oregon Agricultural College, with the 1912 class. He entered into his work immediately after his graduation with George W. Epley, of Sheridan, where he remained for seven months, coming to Bend, where he was associated with the Owl Pharmacy during the year 1913-14, going to Eugene where he was engaged by Sherwin & Moore, prominent Eugene druggists. He was employed with this Eugene firm for two years and returned to Bend again and was with the Owl Pharmacy for a year until the opening of the new firm. Chas. W. Erskine, junior partner, is a graduate of Willamette University and a graduate of the Law School of the University of Oregon. Mr. Erskine is manager of the Bend Commercial Club and Deputy District Attorney for Crook county. Mr. Erskine will maintain his practice of law, and will be financially interested with the firm, but not actively engaged in the business.

J. Ryan & Co. have moved their offices from the old Lara building on Wall street to the new O'Kane, conducting a real estate, loan and insurance business. In the same offices with Mr. Ryan will be Guy H. Wilson, contractor and builder, and it is probable that the Western Union Telegraph company will locate its down town offices in this room.

Louis Bennett, grocer, successor to W. C. McCuiston, has commodious store rooms in the new O'Kane Building which he is fitting out with entirely new fixtures. Mr. Bennett is a recent arrival from Medford, Oregon, where he conducted a successful grocery business in the Jackson county metropolis.

Dream Theatre Modern. The Dream Theatre, of which L. C. Rudow is manager, occupies a large portion of the ground floor of the southeast portion of the building. Mr. Rudow will move in the next two weeks from his present show house on Bond street to his new home. This show house is probably the most up-to-date movie play house in Central Oregon. Every convenience has been provided for comfort of its patrons. Mr. Rudow has been a resident of Bend for a number of years and expects to maintain the highest possible standard in the moving picture business.

The second floor of the O'Kane building is almost entirely occupied by professional men, all of whom have been provided with the best facilities for their respective businesses.

Drs. Vandever & Edwards occupy the corner suite of three rooms, which have been fitted out especially for their profession. They have a large reception room, and each have their private offices off the reception room. Dr. Vandever is almost a native son of Oregon, coming to Oregon when he was seven years

old. He received his common school education in Bend and later went to Willamette University, graduating from the medical department in 1914. While studying in his senior year he took special work in the Convalescent Hospital in Portland and subsequent to his graduation obtained training in the St. Vincent Hospital in Portland. Dr. Vandever opened his practice in Bend, June, 1915, and while east this last summer took some special work at Rush Medical College in Chicago. Associated with Dr. Vandever in the practice of medicine is Dr. R. L. Edwards, recently of Portland. Dr. Edwards has been an Oregon resident since childhood, having resided a number of years in both Linn and Lane counties, where he received his common and high school education. He was a classmate of Dr. Vandever at Willamette University and is a graduate of the medical department of the University of Oregon.

H. H. DeArmond, attorney at law, has been engaged in the practice of law in Bend since May, 1911, coming here from Medford, where he began his practice in 1910, shortly after his graduation from the law school of the University of Oregon. Mr. DeArmond served as manager of the Bend Commercial Club during the year 1914 and at the last session of the Oregon Irrigation Congress he was elected vice president of that organization. Mr. DeArmond has been prominently identified with the Central Oregon Irrigation Water Users' Association in their legal fight with the Central Oregon Irrigation company.

The Central Credit Bureau, of which Grant T. Raymond is manager, is an institution of recent organization in Bend. Mr. Raymond came to Bend last March from Portland, where he was engaged as reporter for the Oregon Public Service Commission. While attending the University of Oregon Law School, he was author of the Universal Law Quiz, in 19 volumes, which is a general review of the principal subjects of law and which is used in many universities as a text book. Before coming to Oregon Mr. Raymond attended the common and high schools of Missoula, Montana, and the University of Montana and was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1914. During the last few weeks Mr. Raymond has effected an organization of the Bend merchants to be known as the Merchants' Protective Association, which will be a practical credit rating system for local merchants.

The Gilson Land & Investment Company will have quarters in the suite of rooms occupied by H. H. DeArmond. E. D. Gilson, recently of Ritzville, Washington, is manager of the company, and will conduct a general real estate, homestead and property exchange business.

Dr. W. W. Faulkner, dentist, has been a resident of Bend for the last six years, during which time he has conducted his practice. Before coming to Bend Dr. Faulkner practiced at Roseburg for a few years subsequent to his graduation from the North Pacific Dental College. With Dr. Faulkner in the same suite of office rooms is Dr. B. Ferrell, physician and surgeon. Dr. Ferrell is a graduate from the medical college of Northwestern University, of the class of 1904, after which he practiced medicine in Carterville, Iowa, and came to Bend in 1909. Before its consolidation with the First National Bank, Dr. Ferrell was president of the First National Bank, and is associated with Dr. U. C. Coe in the Bend Hospital, which was opened August, 1915.

Dr. W. G. Manning came to Bend last year, a graduate from the North Pacific Dental College, of Portland. Dr. Manning attended the Oregon Agricultural College in 1908 and 1909, and also attended Lincoln High School, of Portland, before studying dentistry.

Drs. Black & Black, chiropractors, are recent arrivals from St. Helens,

Oregon, where they practiced for a number of years. Shortly after their arrival, Drs. Black & Black purchased Bend property with the view to making Bend their home.

EMBLEM DECORATIVE

Club Device Used on O'Kane Building, Also by Shevlin Company.

One of the attractive features of the O'Kane building, which is now rapidly nearing completion at the corner of Oregon and Bond streets, is the use of the Bend emblem of the Emblem Club. The emblem is set in the transom over each window in leaded glass and also is placed in the stairway window at the rear of the building.

NEW O'KANE BUILDING IS MODERN TYPE

COST IS ESTIMATED AT \$50,000.00

ALL ROOMS OCCUPIED

New Theatre Will Have Ideal Quarters For Playhouses--Offices are Large and Well Lighted--Mr. O'Kane's Apartments Neat.

The O'Kane Building, of which Hugh O'Kane is builder, is reputed to be the finest business block in Central Oregon. It cost approximately \$50,000, is semi-fire proof in construction, two stories and its dimensions are 100 feet by 140 feet. The Oregon street and Bond street walls are constructed of reinforced concrete and the rear walls are of brick. Seven rooms, all of which are now occupied are on the ground floor, into which business firms of Bend have moved during the last two weeks. Stucco work is carried out in white cement and white sand, trimmed with tile and ornamental plaster. All the walls of the first floor are crib walls covered with fire proof plaster board, a sort of asbestos fibre. The building is full two stories. The second floor is almost entirely taken up with offices for professional men. The building is heated by the vacuum steam heat system, a popular new system that is being installed in buildings in many large cities.

The main entrance to the second floor of the O'Kane building is on Oregon street, is large and the design is in harmony with the type of architecture of the rest of the building. The entrance is hand carved, well lighted. The vestibule floor is of tile and marble. Each of the business firms has ample window display room.

The entrance to the Dream Theatre is attractively set off by the handsome marquee of wire and colored glass. There are eight large doors at the entrance of the theatre. In the center of the theatre front is the projecting box office which is constructed of glass and marble. Between the entrance and the main floor is a vestibule of sufficient width
