BEND'S OPPORTUNITY.

The latest issue of the Klamath Record says, editorially:

"Once in a while there leaks out the tale of a hot game of poker when a king's ransom goes into the jackpot. Does it ever occur to you that the railroad game played in Klamath Falls transcends any game of chance that ever was played, no matter how fabulous the stakes?"

"What are the stakes? The life and prosperity of a city for generations to come."

"The prosperity or the sure failure and ultimate ruin of an agricultural population and territory as large as an eastern state or European kingdom. The fortunes of ourselves and children. If we do not rise to the occasion and furnish at once the rights of way and terminals necessary we will hold up the next deal. If we delay Bend will step forward with a proposition to commence construction at their end of the line and comply with the requirements that Mr. Strahorn thinks necessary to success and Klamath Falls would lose the opportunity to be the center of operations from the first."

Is Bend doing anything?

ONE THOUSAND HANDS.

Just what does it mean to Bend in dollars and cents to have here two industries employing over 1,000 men?

The following summary of the meaning to the community is taken from the New York Herald.

"An interesting and accurate calculation has been made of what an industry employing 1,000 hands means to a community."

"It increases the population by 5,000 consumers."

"It adds \$90,000 to the value of public utilities."

"The assessment is increased by \$600,000."

"It pays out annually in salaries and wages \$559,800."

"(Bend's industries pay over a million annually.)"

"It represents through its buildings and houses of its employees an investment of \$2,000,000."

"The annual expenditure in food would be \$63,000 in meat, \$9,600 in potatoes, \$5,000 in sugar, \$18,550 in milk, \$65,700 in butter and \$27,600 in eggs."

"Summed up, this means that an industry employing 1,000 hands is worth \$221,600 a year to the farmers of the district."

"The expenditure in clothing would be \$168,750."

"With the annual payment of taxes added to the total expenditure, goods and clothing, you have in all \$2,428,350 turned into the town in one year through the coming of one great industry. In conclusion, one may again note the prodigious results which are effected by the presence in Canada of some 435,000 artisans. In round figures these men would mean at least \$1,056,322,350 to the Dominion."

"An industry employing 1,000 hands may be regarded as a large one, but the same percentage of results would follow in larger or smaller plants, so that one can easily begin to reckon for himself what any particular industry would mean to a town or city."

"At least 25 per cent may be safely added to the above figures to conform to present-day prices."

MAIL AND SIDEWALKS.

We are getting nearer to free mail delivery. A house numbering system has been adopted and street signs have been put up. There remains the matter of sidewalks. In this the council is giving its help by arranging for a survey and listing of all sidewalks in town, with a view to connecting up the various units. It is also possible for the council to proceed to order sidewalks where none exist to meet the last requirement of the postal department before the delivery service can be begun.

If these are ordered, however, they must be the sidewalks stipulated by the ordinances of the city. Such would cost a great deal. The simple way for property owners to avoid the great expense is to take the department's word that anything that a carrier can walk on will be taken as a sidewalk, lay planks, or put down cinders, and avoid the necessity of an order by the council.
