

# Spirit of Giving Is Rife; The H. C. of L. Forgotten

There's a mighty big pile of merchandise leaving the Bend stores these days.

This outgoing flood of merchandise is not confined to any one establishment, any two or three or half dozen. The condition is general, from the largest to the smallest. The volume of business this pre-holiday season far surpasses any other Bend or Central Oregon has ever seen.

Shops are busily engaged in taking goods down from their shelves and putting them over the counters to their customers.

One has only to spend a very few minutes in any one of the many popular mercantile establishments to appreciate the spirit of buying this year. For some reason, presumably the Christmas spirit's predominating, the H. C. of L. has, for the time being, been forgotten. But to see the quality of buying it might, on the other hand, appear that shoppers, realizing the growing cost of commodities, are not only stocking up in useful articles for themselves, but are thinking of their friends and relatives in the same light they think of themselves.

"The buying of useful gifts this year far overshadows the buying of trinkets," said one merchant this morning. "Novelties seem to have given place to more essential accessories."

Two little girls, their ages about

14 years, hurried up to the counter of one of the stores this morning. "Mother wants a new coat, 'cause I heard her say so to father last night," said the older of the two, "and I heard father say, 'he'd see,' and so I came down here to tell you if he comes in you tell him I don't want anything much, but see that mother gets her coat." That was one evidence of the spirit of giving manifested by a youthful shopper.

"It's a hard matter to select anything for Jim," one lady said speaking to a fellow shopper. She, evidently, was referring to her husband. "You see he never makes his wants known, and says I'd better spend my Christmas allowance on someone else. But I always notice that he never overlooks any of the wants of the family himself."

"We're going to have a better Christmas this year than we have had in a long time," said a plainly dressed lady, with whom were three little children, the oldest no more than eleven years old. "John has been working steady for the last nine months at the mill, and we feel a little more able to do something this Christmas."

There is a general strain among buyers this season which seems to manifest that people are more able to give than last year or many former years, and coupled with the ability, there is patent evidence of the strong desire.

Alex. L. Mackintosh, county commissioner of Deschutes county, was born in the Highlands of Scotland and is 47 years old. In 1881 he moved to the Falkland Islands, off the coast of South America, where he worked in the sheep business, removing to Oregon in 1885 and to Crook county in 1888.

### RUSSIAN ATTACKS FAIL; ARMY HEADS RETURN TO HOMES

(By United Press to The Daily Bulletin) BERLIN, via Sayville, Dec. 20.—It was announced today that Russian attacks on the east bank of the Golden in Bistritzia failed. Artillery fire is more active on the Macedonian front. Isolated patrol clashes and cannonading are reported on the western front. Newspapers declared that the French General Berthelot, commanding the Roumanian forces, has asked for a recall. The majority of the British officers attached to the Roumanian general staff have already started toward England.

### RUSSO-ROUMANIANS WIN NEAR PARLATA

(By United Press to The Daily Bulletin) PETROGRAD, Dec. 20.—It is announced that the Russo-Roumanian forces have repulsed attacks on the left bank of the Danube near Parlata. Heavy flank fighting at Dobruja, and intense fighting on the Macedonian front, is reported.

prominent part in irrigation matters affecting his section and has been prominently identified with Tumalo development affairs.

Mr. Barnes is unmarried. County Commissioner Lew E. Smith, of Redmond, is the youngest member of the new court, having been born on February 6, 1873, at McHenry, Illinois. He attended local public and high schools and then, the family having moved to Lincoln, Nebraska, spent three years in the University of Nebraska, followed by a business course in the Bryant & Stratton school, of Chicago.

In the middle nineties Mr. Smith became the manager of a lumber yard in Lincoln, later, with his brother, managing the business of the Foster & Smith Lumber Co., after the death of his father. The brothers sold out this business in 1903, moving to Arlington, Washington, where they operated a shingle mill for the following six years. Selling out the shingle mill in 1909, Mr. Smith moved to Crook county, making extensive investments in farm lands in the Sisters and Redmond sections.

Mr. Smith was married in 1896 to Anna Schudel, of Macon, Illinois, whom he had met while at the University of Nebraska. They have five
