THREE NEAR BEERS ALL HE DRANK, BUT LOGGER PAYS FINE

Although pleading that he had consumed only three drinks of near beer, J. L. Bartlett, a logger, charged with drunkenness and disorderly conduct, was found guilty last night in municipal court by Judge H. C. Ellis, fined \$25 and sentenced to 10 days in the county jail. He left his watch and other valuables with the court, as security, while he sought out friends from whom he borrowed the amount of the fine.

Officer Frank Culp, who made the arrest Monday night, and Jack Palmerton were witness for the city, Officer Culp stating that the man admitted his inebriation when arrested, and Palmerton describing Bartlett's actions earlier in the evening. He was unwilling to say, however, that the prisoner was drunk.

City Attorney H. H. DeArmond represented the prosecution, while J. A. More appeared for the defendant.
