## "BUY A HOME."

The following editorial from the Los Angeles Times, published in a city where there is perennial real boom, with high and ever mounting prices, is commended to the real estate men and property holders of Bend, where prices for the most part probably are lower than they ever will be again. It is worth clipping and pasting in a scrap book.

Every married man should own his own home. Did anybody ever know of a robin hatching and raising her young in another robin's nest, or a fox sleeping in the hole in the earth of another fox? Better own a cottage than hire a palace. Lazarus sleeps sounder in the hut he owns than does Dives in the palace he rents. The man who owns his home can say: "These roses distill their perfume for me; the white blossoms of these lillies are mine; the jessamine that climbs about this porch is mine. I can stand in my garden and say, 'from the infernal fires beneath me, to the radiant stars above, earth and air are mine.'" The home of our childhood once abandoned is forever lost. It may have been a hut standing on the ugliest patch of ground the earth affords, yet so wrapped round the heart is it, so charged with youthful imagery in every stick and stone of it, that the gilded castle, built in after life, with all the rare and costly furnishings that art and ingenuity can afford is but an empty barn beside it. In no place on earth is it so easy to own a home as in this City of Angola. The columns of the Times are filled with advertisements offering homes for sale with payments of \$200 or \$100 or even \$50 down, with further payments extended in monthly installments of \$10 to \$20 each over a period of ten years or more at 7 per cent interest.

Buy a home, declare on it as a homestead and no storms of fortune can ever take it from you. You can say: "Hence far from me ye senseless joys That fade before ye reach the heart— The crowded dome's distracted noise, Where all is pomp and useless art. Give me my home to quiet dear, Where hours untold and peaceful move; So fate ordain I sometimes there May voices hear of those I love."

## TUMALO BILL.

When the State of Oregon, four years ago, appropriated \$450,000 with which to build the Tumalo project it recognized its moral obligation to the settlers who had taken up land under a Carey act project impliedly guaranteed by the state. The project was built and its lands advertised for sale when the news of leaks in the reservoir began to cast suspicion on its future.

There is now proposed a definite plan to examine the condition of the reservoir and if it is found feasible, to stop the leaks and make the reservoir what it was expected to be when the project was built. A bill to this effect, appropriating \$25,000 for the expense involved, has been offered in the Legislature and should pass.

The plan is one that vitally affects every project settler and landowner and indirectly, every interest of this section. All should join in a concerted request that the bill be passed and the appropriation made.

If the state saw its moral obligation four years ago the same should be true today and the Legislature should follow the course dictated by the obligation and by good business, as well.

## UP TO PORTLAND.

(From Friday's Daily.)

At last the question of aid for the Strahorn railroad is definitely up to Portland. The Rose City is now to be given an opportunity to show what it can do—for others. No one can doubt its ability to boost—for Portland. Will it now come up to scratch and put in a few licks for Central Oregon.

If the Portland vision were broad enough its people would see that aid for the Strahorn road is no charity. If, for a moment, they could think in terms of the commonwealth and not those of the municipality, they would realize that every dollar they put into Mr. Strahorn's hands would inevitably come back many fold.

Portland's one idea is to get the people of the state to come to the city to spend their money at festivals, conventions and congresses.

Looking at it from that side alone they should be only too glad to help build a railroad that will make it easier for the people to get to Portland with their money.

From the beginning the only question as to the success of Mr. Strahorn's plans has been felt to depend on Portland. A few of its broad-minded, big-minded men, have pledged their support and, already have been of great assistance to the railroad builder. But they cannot do it alone. Now we shall see if the city will join.

## COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

ordered to advertise for proposals for books for record purposes, for transcripts of Crook County records, for necessary furniture, and office supplies according to the several specifications on file, said call for bids to specify that the Court reserved the right to reject any and all bids, or to continue the date of consideration thereof, that certified checks payable to the County Treasurer be attached to all bids, that all bids be filed not later than 5:00 o'clock P. M. on January 27, 1917, and that such bids be publicly opened on January 29, 1917, at any hour of said day convenient to the court.

**County Fair.**—Petitions were presented from citizens of Redmond and Sisters asking for locations for County Fair, and it was then ordered that consideration of this matter be continued until the next regular meeting.

**In the Matter of County Accounting.**—Ordered that the County Judge correspond with and employ a competent accountant to prescribe the forms for account books for the several officials.

**County Official Newspaper.**—This matter then came on for hearing, and it appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that the Bend Bulletin, a weekly newspaper printed and published at Bend, Deschutes County, Oregon, has the largest circulation of any newspaper published weekly within this county as required by Chapter 2902 of Lord's Oregon Laws, which said Bend Bulletin proposes to publish the proceedings of this court, and all the official reports required by law of the several county officers to be published, at the rate of \$25.00 per month, and after due consideration of said matter, it was ordered, That the Bend Bulletin, a weekly newspaper printed and published in Bend, Deschutes County, be and the same is hereby designated and appointed the official newspaper of said county as required by said Chapter 2902 of Lord's Oregon Laws.

**In the Matter of the Supervision of Road Work.**—Ordered, that each member of this court have the supervision of the road work pertaining to his district subject to the approval of the other members of the court.

**In the Matter of the County Agriculturist.**—Ordered, that the office of County Agriculturist be established and maintained in this county, and that the clerk be and hereby is instructed to notify the State Agricultural College of this order.

After due consideration by the court, the court, the following matters were continued to the next meeting, to-wit:

1. The appointment of road supervisors.
  2. Establishing of road, and school districts.
  3. Establishing and fixing of the boundaries of election precinct and voting places.
  4. The appointment of Judges and clerks of election.
  5. The consideration of the "widows pension" law, and its application.
  6. The consideration of the Rabbit Bounty bill and its application.
  7. The Coyote Bounty Law, and the payment of bounties thereunder.
- On motion duly made and seconded, the court was then adjourned to meet at the Council Chamber in the O'Kane Building in Bend on January 29, 1917, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock A. M.

## IN THE MATTER OF THE CREATION AND ORGANIZATION OF DESCHUTES COUNTY, OREGON.

WHEREAS, at the regular election held on the 7th day of November, 1916, it was submitted to the voters of Crook County, Oregon the question of the creation of Deschutes County, out of the territory embraced within the limits of Crook County, and

WHEREAS, upon the canvass of the votes by the Secretary of State it was found that Deschutes County had been created.

THEREFORE, the Governor of the State of Oregon issued his proclamation as follows:

## PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, there was submitted to the legal electors of Crook County, Oregon, at the general election for said county and state, held on the 7th day of November, 1916, the creation of a new county to be known as Deschutes County and to embrace the westerly portion of said Crook County described by boundaries as follows:

Beginning at the northwest corner of Crook County where the common boundary of Crook and Jefferson Counties terminates at the easterly boundary of Linn County; thence east on the line between townships 13 and 14 south, to the northeast corner of township 14 S., R. 13 E. W. M.; thence south on the line between ranges 13 and 14 east, to the northeast corner of T. 17 S., R. 13 E. W. M.; thence east on the line between townships 16 and 17 south, to the northeast corner of T. 19 S., R. 14 E. W. M.; thence south on the line between ranges 14 and 15 east to the northeast corner of T. 19 S., R. 14 E. W. M.; thence east on the line between townships 18 and 19 south to the northwest corner of T. 19 S., R. 16 E. W. M.; thence south on the

line between ranges 16 and 17 east to the northwest corner of T. 20 S., R. 16 E. W. M.; thence east on the line between townships 19 and 20 south to the northwest corner of T. 20 S., R. 19 E. W. M.; thence south on the line between ranges 19 and 20 east to the northeast corner of T. 21 S., R. 19 E. W. M.; thence east on the line between townships 20 and 21 south to the northeast corner of T. 21 S., R. 20 E. W. M.; thence south on the line between ranges 20 and 21 east to the northeast corner of T. 22 S., R. 20 E. W. M.; thence east on the line between townships 21 and 22 to the northeast corner of T. 22 S., R. 23 E. W. M.; on the line of Crook County; thence south on the line between ranges 23 and 24 east to the corner common to Crook, Harney and Lake Counties; thence west along the south boundary of Crook County to the southwest corner of Crook County at the point where the line between townships 22 and 23 south intersects the easterly boundary of Lane County; thence in a general northerly direction along the easterly boundary of Lane and Linn Counties to the point of beginning and

WHEREAS, on the 13th day of December, 1916, the Secretary of State, pursuant to law and in my presence as Governor of the State of Oregon, did canvass the votes cast for and against the creation of said Deschutes County; and

WHEREAS, it was ascertained and determined upon canvass that not less than sixty-five (65) per cent of the electors residing in Crook County within the limits of the proposed new county, cast votes in favor of the creation of said county, and not less than thirty-five (35) per cent of the electors residing in Crook County outside the limits of said proposed new county, cast votes in favor of the creation of said county;

NOW THEREFORE, I, JAMES WITHYCOMBE, as Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority in me vested by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation and do announce and declare that the number of votes required by law have been cast in favor of the creation of said Deschutes County and the said Deschutes County is hereby declared to be created and to embrace that part of said Crook County, Oregon, as hereinbefore described.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the State of Oregon, to be hereunto affixed. DONE at the Capitol at Salem, Oregon, this 13th day of December, A. D. 1916. JAMES WITHYCOMBE, Governor.

And thereafter the Governor of the State of Oregon duly appointed and commissioned the County Judge and two County Commissioners of said Deschutes County, Oregon, as follows:

Wm. D. Barnes, County Judge. A. L. Mackintosh, County Commissioner. Lew E. Smith, County Commissioner.

And thereafter on the 18th day of December, 1916, the said County Judge and County Commissioner met at a regular session at Bend, Oregon, and formally accepted their offices and formally took their oaths of office before Vernon A. Forbes, Notary Public for Oregon and qualified as follows:

James Withycombe, Governor of the State of Oregon, having commissioned William D. Barnes, of Tumalo, Oregon, as County Judge of Deschutes County and A. L. Mackintosh, of Bend, Oregon, as Commissioner of said Deschutes County, and Lew E. Smith, of Redmond, Oregon, as Commissioner of said Deschutes County, Oregon, and said William D. Barnes, A. L. Mackintosh and Lew E. Smith met at Bend, Oregon on the 18th day of December, 1916, at 3:00 o'clock p. m. and there took their oaths of office before the said Vernon A. Forbes as above, and did mail said oaths to the Secretary of State, together with the necessary fees required by law.

Mullarkey, County Assessor. Samuel E. Roberts, County Sheriff. Elmer Niswonger, Coroner. George S. Young, Surveyor. Dwight F. Miller, County Physician. J. Alton Thompson, Superintendent of Schools.

Which nominations were seconded by Commissioner Lew E. Smith and unanimously elected and the County Judge thereupon ordered and declared that the following persons were duly elected as officers of Deschutes County, Oregon, to serve until the next general election or until their successors are elected and qualified:

J. H. Haner, County Clerk. Clyde M. McKay, County Treasurer. W. T. Mullarkey, County Assessor. Samuel E. Roberts, County Sheriff.

And afterwards the following proclamation concerning the temporary county seat of Deschutes County was read and ordered published as provided by law.

PROCLAMATION In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for Deschutes County, BE IT REMEMBERED, that whereas there was duly and regularly called a special term of the County Court of Deschutes County, Oregon, at Bend, Oregon, on the 20th day of December, 1916, at the hour
