WHEREAS, said County Court met in said Special Session for the purpose of selection and determining the location of the temporary County Seat of Deschutes County, Oregon, and all of said County Court being present, as aforesaid, and voting

thereon, and that each and every member of said County Court, to-wit: Wm. D. Barnes, County Judge, A. L. Mackintosh, County Commissioner, Lew E. Smith, County Commissioner, voted to fix the temporary County Seat of said Deschutes County, Oregon, at Bend, Oregon.

Now, therefore, we, Wm. D. Barnes, County Judge; A. L. Mackintosh, County Commissioner, and Lew E. Smith, County Commissioner, acting as the County Court of Deschutes County, Oregon, in obedience to, and by virtue of the power and authority vested by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation, and do announce and declare that the unanimous vote of this Court was cast in favor of the selection of Bend, Oregon, to be the temporary County Seat of Deschutes County, Oregon, and that said Bend, Oregon, is hereby declared to be, and in the temporary County Seat of Deschutes County, Oregon, until the first general election thereafter, and until the qualified voters of said Deschutes County, Oregon, shall vote for the selection of the place for the permanent County Seat of said Deschutes County, Oregon, in the manner provided by law.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, we have set our hands and seals this 20th day of December, A. D., 1916. Wm. D. BARNES, County Judge, A. L. MACKINTOSH, LEW E. SMITH, County Commissioners, Deschutes County, Oregon.

THEREUPON, the County Court of said Deschutes County adjourned to meet again at 3:00 o'clock of the afternoon of said day.

Bend, Oregon, December 20, 1916. The County Court met at the Council room in the O'Kane building in Bend, Oregon, pursuant to adjournment, members present, Wm. D. Barnes, County Judge, and A. L. Mackintosh and Lew E. Smith, County Commissioners; J. H. Haner, County Clerk, and S. E. Roberts, County Sheriff.

Meeting called to order at 3:00 o'clock by the County Judge. In the matter of the bond of S. E. Roberts, as Tax Collector:

This matter coming on for hearing for the determination of the amount of the bond to be required of the Sheriff covering his duties as ex-officio Tax Collector, and it appearing to the satisfaction of the Court, that a bond of \$30,000.00 will be sufficient at this time, it was therefore ordered, that the bond of S. E. Roberts, as ex-officio Tax Collector, be and the same is hereby fixed at Thirty Thousand Dollars.

In the matter of the bond of C. M. McKay, County Treasurer: This matter coming on for hearing for the determination of the amount of the bond to be required of the County Treasurer, and it appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that a bond of \$10,000.00 will be proper and sufficient at this time, it is therefore ordered, that the bond of the County Treasurer be and the same is hereby fixed at Ten Thousand Dollars.

In the matter of the filing of sufficient official bonds:

It is hereby ordered that all officers appointed by this Court, from whom a bond is required by law or by order of this Court, be and they hereby are required to file bonds for the approval of this Court not later than Saturday, December 23, 1916.
