**NO BOUNTIES ON RABBITS**  
(Continued from Page 1.)

whether Deschutes county is authorized and required to pay the bounty on jackrabbits and sage rats, provided to be paid by Crook county in the special act submitted to the electors of that county at the last election.

"Referring to said act, I find that Section 1 provides:

"That the County Court of Crook County, Oregon, be and it is hereby empowered, authorized and directed to order paid from the general fund of said county, or from a special fund created for that purpose, the sum of five cents for each jackrabbit, and the sum of two and one-half cents for each sage rat that may be killed within the boundaries of said county from and after the first day of December, 1916."

Deschutes Left Out.

"Section 2 provides for the levy of a tax to produce the necessary funds which tax is to be levied in Crook county. Section 3 provides for filing claims for such bounty, which claim is to be filed with the Clerk of Crook County and must make affidavit, among other things, that the jackrabbits or sage rats from which the scalps were taken were killed in Crook County, that the scalps must be counted by the Clerk of Crook County, and in fact all things must be done by Crook County, under the provisions of said act. Referring to the language above quoted from Section 1, it is clear that the bounties are only to be paid upon scalps taken from rabbits and rodents killed in Crook County after the first of December, 1916, and the election by virtue of which Deschutes County was organized was held on November 7, 1916, and the Governor's proclamation declaring the re-

sult thereof was issued on or about the 5th of December, if I remember correctly. Thereupon the territory in the new county of Deschutes was no longer within the boundaries of Crook County and no rabbits or rodents killed in Deschutes County could be killed within the boundaries of Crook County after the organization of the former. The other provisions referred to bear out this conclusion. I am, therefore, of the opinion that said local law does not authorize the payment by Deschutes County of the scalp bounty therein.
