The Flag should not be hoisted before sunrise nor allowed to remain after sunset, nor should it be allowed to remain up during a rain or storm.

At "Morning and Evening Colors" civilian spectators should stand at "attention" and uncover during the playing of the "Star Spangled Banner." Military spectators are required by regulation to stand at "attention" and give the military salute.

The Flag should never be allowed to touch the ground and should never be raised or lowered by any mechanical appliance.

When the National Colors are passing on parade or in review, the spectator should, if walking, halt, and if sitting, arise and stand at attention and uncover.

Whenever the "Star Spangled Banner" is being played or sung, all persons within hearing distance should rise and stand, uncovered, during its rendition. When the Nation and state or other flags fly together, the National Flag should be on the right. The National Salute is, under the law of nations, 21 guns.

Whenever possible the Flag should be flown from a staff or mast, but should not be fastened to the side of a building, platform or scaffolding. It should not be used as a cover over a table, desk or box, and where anything can be set or placed upon the Flag.

When the Flag is used out of doors, it should always be allowed to fly in the breeze.

When clusters and drapings of colors are desired, hunting or cloth should be used, but never the Flag.

The Flag should never be placed below a person sitting.

Let every loyal citizen of this great nation instill into the minds and hearts of the future generations a profound reverence for the Flag, teach them that it stands a pre-

eminent symbol for those principles of Religious and Political Liberty embodied in the Constitution of the United States of America.
