Patriotic feeling ran high in Bend last night when 10 young men from this city, Redmond and Prineville, left with Recruiting Officer S. Harts, for Portland, to enter the service of the United States navy, in the war against Germany. John Latham and Ernest Bell, who left earlier in the week, Bruce Deyarmond, Paul Wiggins and Don Rogers, who will go tonight, and F. E. Bullock, who will join the aviation corps in Seattle next week, bring the total up to 16.

Bend patriots gathered at the depot to give the recruits a rousing sendoff, and patriotic demonstrations were staged by the Masons and the Moose lodge in honor of Bruce Deyarmond, of the former order, and Roy Menasco, of the latter. Mr. Deyarmond is the first member of the local Masonic fraternity to enter Uncle Sam's military or naval service, and his last meeting with the lodge was turned into a patriotic jubilee.

**More Will Join.** Indications were that many more would enlist in some branch of the service, and it was announced today that T. L. Carriger, formerly of the navy, would take care of applicants in that department, while Postmaster Henry B. Ford will receive applications for either army or navy. Joe Rock, naturalized Italian, declared today that he and 20 young men working for him will be ready to go into the army whenever their adopted country needs them.

Indignation was unbounded among employees of the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Co., over the loss of an American flag, stolen from the flag staff in front of the general offices at the plant. The theft is believed to be the work of an alien, but no traces as to the identity of the man were found today.

# POWER PLANT TO INCREASE SIZE

## NEW GENERATOR TO BE ADDED AT ONCE.

Bend Water, Light & Power Co. Will Complete City Plant by Putting in Final Unit—Cost Will Be About \$30,000.

Construction of the third and probably final unit of the city plant of the Bend Water, Light & Power Co. will begin at once, according to an announcement made by Manager T. H. Foley this morning. Mr. Foley's statement followed the receipt of a telegram from K. B. Miller, of Chicago, stockholder in the company, and its expert electrical engineer, to the effect that necessary machinery had been contracted, and directing that concrete work for the addition be begun at once.

The new unit will connect with the present building, occupying space left for growth when the present plant was built in 1912 and will mark the building's completion. It will be about 35x40 feet in size, making the whole building about 100x40.

The machinery ordered for the new unit includes a 600 horse power water wheel and a 600 kilowatt generator, adding over 50 per cent to the capacity of the plant, which now operates two 500 kilowatt generators.

**\$30,000 to Be Cost.** Building and machinery will cost around \$30,000. Concrete work is to be begun at once and it is expected that the building will be ready for occupancy and the machinery installed in about five months.

Other work in which the company is engaged at present includes the laying of a 1400 line of eight inch pipe to connect the west side reservoir with the pipe line in Boulevard addition for the purpose of preventing the water shortage on the west side, which has occurred in past seasons.

# SCHOOL DISTRICT ELECTION IS SET TO VOTE ON BONDS

\$30,000 ISSUE TO FINANCE PURCHASE OF BUILDING SITES, AND ERECTION OF NEW SCHOOL UNITS, WILL BE DECIDED APRIL 26.

Involving the determination of a policy of general school development, voters in the Bend district will cast their ballots on April 26, deciding whether or not the district shall bond itself for \$30,000 for the purchase of building sites and the construction of schools in the city. Notices of the election are now being prepared, and it is probable that the voting will take place in the council chambers of the O'Kane building.

The setting of the election was made possible by the filing of a petition asking for the bond issue, specifying that the money should be used for the construction of an additional unit to the new high school building, the erection of a grade school unit, the purchase of two lots in North Addition adjacent to block x, already owned by the district, and the purchase of a school site in Boulevard addition.

More than 20 taxpayers signed the petition.

LUTHER BURBANK, IN LETTER TO MONTELLE COE, DECLARES CENTRAL OREGON SHOULD RAISE TUBERS EQUAL TO ANY GROWN IN UNITED STATES.

While unable to attend, Mr. Burbank praised the object of the potato contest, and in answer to Mr. Coe's inquiry if he could offer any suggestions as to the proper conducting of the contest, stated that the rule-already adopted for entering the competition, and for the determination of the winners, seemed to him so admirable that he would be unable to give any new advice on the subject.

# GERMAN SUSPECTS ARRESTED IN BEND IS REPORTED

SECRET SERVICE MEN MAY HAVE TAKEN SPIES MENACING SAFETY OF LOCAL INDUSTRIES WITHOUT ENLISTING BEND OFFICIALS, IS BELIEF.

Reports that two Germans, believed to be spies, were captured here by Pinkerton secret service men, were current in Bend today. The Germans, it was said, had complete plans of local manufactories, bridges and roadways in their possession, when taken into custody.

Careful inquiry failed to reveal any definite corroboration of the report. Bend manufacturers professed entire ignorance of the affair, and Sheriff S. E. Roberts and Chief of Police Nixon stated that if any such arrests have taken place, there had been no effort made to secure the cooperation of the local authorities.

The only statement in support of the rumor came in the statement of a county official, who declared that he had good reason to believe that secret service men have been investigating conditions in Bend for the last few days.
