

RURAL CREDIT FORMS ARRIVE

FULL DIRECTIONS FOR TAKING ADVANTAGE OF THE FEDERAL FARM LOANS SENT BY SPOKANE LAND BANK.

(From Tuesday's Daily.)

Exact directions for the organization of farm loan associations under the Federal Rural Credit bill, and the necessary method of procedure in securing such loans, have just been received by U. S. Commissioner H. C. Ellis, of this city, from the Federal Land Bank of Spokane. Application blanks for the loans are included, and standard forms for the by-laws to be adopted by the associations, are to be sent later.

Borrowers may not take less than \$100, nor more than \$10,000, according to the Rural Credits law. While the number seeking loans is relatively small, it is expected that an increase will be noted with the growth of the farm and home preparedness propaganda.
