**TWO ORGANIZATIONS OF STOCKMEN FORMED**

Fort Rock and Fremont Associations Represent 500 Cattle Grazing On National Forests.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

Plowing their way through snow drifts and muddy roads, Forest Supervisor W. G. Hastings and Assistant Supervisor V. V. Harpham arrived in Fort Rock in time Monday to assist in the organization of a stockmen's association, while a similar organization was perfected at Fremont on the day following. Mr. Hastings reported today on returning from the trip. Some 200 head of cattle are represented in the Fort Rock association, and 300 at Fremont.

Officers for the Fort Rock association include Matt Raber, president; R. L. Noel secretary; Peter Raber, Harry Crampton, Charles Erdman, H. A. Crampton and Matt Raber, members of the advisory board. Fremont officers are John Glaze, president; Sam Olmstead, vice president; W. E. McCallum, secretary-treasurer, and Mr. Glaze, Mr. McCallum, C. Stewart and Harry Mittelholz, members of the advisory board.

**FILES AFFIDAVIT**

I, Fred N. Van Matre, of Bend, Oregon, being first duly sworn, depose and say that I have read in the newspapers and heard otherwise, statements to the effect that in a public trial of Frank Sheffield for "bootlegging," my name was mentioned in the testimony in such way as to give the impression that I was associated with the said Sheffield in his illegal acts; that, as a matter of fact, I never received from said Sheffield, directly or indirectly, any intoxicating liquor whatsoever, nor did I know or have reason to believe that he was handling or disposing of such liquor, though on a recent occasion I did see him in an intoxicated condition and warned him to keep off the street—the only time I ever spoke to the man; that I never received from him any package whatsoever,

containing liquor or anything else, at any time; that I was not subpoenaed as a witness in the case against Sheffield, though word was left as my house asking me to appear at the trial, which I took no notice of because I had several men employed in work that needed my attention, and I did not suppose a matter of so special importance would be so informally treated; that I make this sworn statement for the purpose of correcting the false and injurious reports about me in this connection.

of the Pilot Butte Inn last month," he declared. "Numerous complaints have been laid before me by various persons to the effect that the law was violated at said time and place, and under Section 29 of the prohibition law it is incumbent upon the district attorney to inquire into any such alleged violations, by issuing subpoenas to those he has reason to believe have some knowledge of the facts, citing such persons to appear before him, or citing them to appear before a magistrate, and in view of this law and believing that a better investigation could be made by having such investigation before a magistrate, I have proceeded under that plan in this investigation."

"At the outset I wish to say that the investigation is not directed at any particular person or persons, nor at any particular hotel, the Pilot Butte Hotel appearing in the proceedings only because the violations, if there were any, occurred at the public opening of that hotel. No person need fear the results of this investigation unless he is guilty of violation, and if any persons are guilty, I believe that his guilt will be disclosed by the investigation. Various reports and rumors have been

made regarding the happenings at such opening, and I consider that it is due the hotel, the public and the officers of the law that this investigation be held, and if such reports are true, we hope to be able to bring any who might have violated the law to trial, and if such reports are not true it will certainly remove any suspicions that might be current in the minds of the public, and therefore should be welcomed by everybody concerned."
