

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Bend, Oregon, April 4, 1917.
The County Court met in the Council Room in the O'Kane building at 10 o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment, all members being present.

The meeting was called to order by the Judge.

In the Matter of the Jaeger Road: This matter coming on for hearing, and after discussion, it was ordered that the Jaeger road be opened, and the following were appointed as a board of viewers to view same on Tuesday, April 10, 1917, Geo. S. Young, A. O. Meyers and F. McCaffery.

In the Matter of Revision of Taxes on Melrose Park Addition to Redmond:

This matter again coming up for hearing, motion was made to continue same until the meeting of April 12.

In the Matter of Vacation of certain streets in Redmond:

The matter of the vacation of certain streets in South End Acres Addition to Redmond, coming on for hearing, and after discussion it was decided to continue same until the adjourned meeting of April 12.

It was ordered that the County Judge and the County Surveyor, be and they are hereby appointed to lay out the Brick Yard road, following as near as practicable the present road, same to be improved to the top of the hill beyond the brick yard.

It was ordered that the supervisor of Road District No. 10 be instructed to repair the bridge across Tumalo creek on the Bear creek-Sisters road, by putting in a pair of new trusses and new mudsill and posts under the east end of said bridge.

Ordered, that the County Clerk be instructed to procure a book and in it keep a record of all property of the County, showing to what officer each piece of property was entrusted, date of purchase, price and any identifying mark or number, requiring each officer to receipt for such property in said book.

F. F. Hafner, having resigned as supervisor of Road District No. 20, his resignation was accepted, and Henry E. Ruffe appointed to fill this vacancy.

It was ordered that the claims for work done on the Terrebonne Road in December be paid.

Ordered, that claims numbered 116 to 163 inclusive, as shown on page 6 of the Docket of Claims, be and the same are hereby allowed, and the Clerk is instructed to issue his warrants in payment thereof.

On motion, duly made and seconded, Court adjourned to meet April 12, 1917.

Bend, Oregon, April 12, 1917.

The County Court met in the Council Room in the O'Kane building, at 10 o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment, the following being present: W. D. Barnes, County Judge; L. E. Smith, Commissioner; S. E. Roberts, Sheriff.

The meeting was called to order by the Judge.

In the Matter of Vacation of Land in Melrose Park Addition to Redmond:

This matter coming up for hearing, it was ordered that the vacation of certain blocks, streets and alleys in Melrose Park Addition to Redmond, be approved.

It was ordered that certain County roads in Southend Acroage be vacated.

It was ordered that the petition of Thomas W. Marshall, asking for the revision and adjusting of taxes in Melrose Park Addition to Redmond, be granted.

The matter of the improvement of roads in the vicinity of Lower Bridge and from there to Terrebonne, the County appropriate not to exceed \$800, this on the condition that the donations by the local residents equal the amount appropriated by the County.

In the Matter of the Jaeger Road: This matter again coming up for hearing, the report of the Board of Road Viewers was presented.

Redmond, Oregon, April 10, 1917.

We, Your Board of Road Viewers, appointed to appraise the benefits and damages on the above entitled Jaeger Road, recommend to the Honorable County Court of Deschutes County, that the extent of damages to C. H. House across the NE 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of Section 20,

for approximately 1 1/4 acres of land is \$29. And we further recommend that said Jaeger Road be moved south 20 feet, placing the road on the northerly 40 ft. of S 1/4 SE 1/4 of said section 20, and that in lieu of such benefits to said C. H. House, we believe all further claim for damages in the way of fencing, culverts, etc., to be offset by such benefits.

It was ordered that the report of the Board of Road Viewers, allowing damages of \$20 to Carl H. House be accepted, and a 40 foot county road be opened on the survey recommended in the report.

The bond of J. C. Thorp, as Justice of the Peace at Tumalo, was presented at this time, and it appearing that same was in proper form, bond was approved.

The resignation of A. C. Armstrong as supervisor for Road District No. 6 having been received, and it appearing to the Court that same should be accepted, it was accepted, and Louis Bladreau, a citizen of Road District No. 6, was appointed as road supervisor for that district. Ordered, that claims numbered 164
