

Building Activity in City Making Good April Showing

Despite such adverse conditions as the plunging of the country into war, and a late spring, Bend building is showing a healthy upward trend, and already in this month 22 building permits have been issued, representing investments totalling \$47,840. Eleven buildings of the total, will represent the major part of the expenditure, \$44,900, the balance being for small improvements on already existing buildings, and for shacks and cabins.

The largest permit taken out is that for the Bend Amateur Athletic gymnasium, while Phillip Brooks' \$5000 permit for the new garage on Wall street, is next in size. Other properties which will add to city values are a \$2000 dwelling and one for \$2000, being put up by Charles A. Carroll in River Terrace, a \$1000 house by H. L. Hilliard, and an \$1899 bungalow by F. Thordarson, both in

River Terrace, two \$1300 bungalows owned by J. Ryan, in Bend View, and a \$3500 frame dwelling by G. A. Beuglar, in Park addition.

Structures Higher Grade.

Other buildings either under construction, or soon to be started are a \$2000 store and residence in Kenwood by Mrs. F. L. Holmes, and a \$1000 dwelling by Mary E. Eastes in the original town of Bend.

While the number of permits being taken out is not as large as last fall, they are on an average, for higher class structures, and the aggregate expenditures, contractors believe, will be considerably greater during the 1917 building season, than in the season of 1916.

Movement of realty, due almost directly to the late spring, is somewhat slow, operators declare, but a rapid increase of business is looked for within the next month.

FORMAL WARNING GIVEN ALIENS IN COUNTY

Under the proclamation of the President of date April 6, 1917, it is unlawful for alien enemies to have in their possession the following articles:

An firearm, weapon, or implement of war, or component part thereof, ammunition, maxim or other silencer, bomb or explosive, or material used in the manufacture of explosives; any aircraft or wireless apparatus, or any form of signaling device, or any form of cipher code, or any paper, document, or book written or printed in cipher, or in which there may be invisible writing.

I am requested by the United States Attorney to publish notice of the above in all the newspapers within this county, and to place the information in the hands of all the police officers, the sheriff and his deputies within the county, and to further notify all alien enemies within this county to bring to either police headquarters of any town or city, or to the office of the sheriff, and there surrender any and all articles which it is unlawful for them to have in their possession under the above provision.

The police officers or sheriff will give to you a receipt for such articles or article surrendered, and at the close of war such articles will be returned to you.

I am further requested to give notice that any alien enemy who fails to surrender such article within 24 hours after such public notice, will be subject to summary arrest if such article shall be found in his possession, and all such articles will be seized and forfeited to the use of the United States.

Therefore, all alien enemies within Deschutes County, Oregon, are hereby given public notice of the provisions of the proclamation of the President above referred to, and are hereby notified to surrender to the sheriff or to the police officers of any city or town in the county within 24 hours after the publication of this notice, any article that you may have in your possession named in the foregoing, and unless you do surrender such article within said time, you are hereby notified that you will be subject to arrest and the forfeiture and confiscation of your property.

ACTION IN OFFERING FREE WATER FOR FOOD PREPAREDNESS GARDENS, BRINGS COMMENT FROM EXECUTIVE.

Commending the action taken by the Bend Water, Light & Power Co., through its manager, T. H. Foley, in allowing free water for back yard gardens in the food preparedness movement, Governor James Withycombe has written to Mr. Foley praising the stand taken by the local company. His letter, received today, is as follows:

"The Public Service commission has just shown me your telegram received in reply to the suggestion which it sent out, that the water service corporations had a patriotic opportunity for service in making special irrigation rates to school children for vacant lot and back yard intensive farming, with a view to helping increase the national food supply. I see that you have gone the suggestion one better and stand ready to give free water service for such use, and that in addition you will also supply free seed.

"I want to congratulate you heartily upon the splendid patriotic action you are taking. It is a notable example for a public service corporation to set and it should have a fine state wide effect. As I had first suggested the possibility of making special water rates for the boys and girls' gardens, I feel especially interested in the project, and am sincerely gratified at the good lead you have set in the premises.

"I think the people of Bend are to be congratulated upon the opportunity which is given them through your company's public spirited action, and I trust that full advantage will be taken of it."

REFERRED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL.

Shall Chapter XXI of the Charter of the City of Bend, Deschutes County, Oregon, be amended by adding thereto a section to be designated "Section 22," and thereby ratify, approve and validate certain warrant indebtedness, in the sum of sixteen thousand, seven hundred and seventeen dollars and twenty-five cents (\$16,717.25), together with interest thereon at six (6) per centum per annum from the date of registration of said warrants, as more fully described in Ordinance No. 56, passed and approved on the 16th day of April, A. D. 1917, and authorize and direct the common council to issue funding bonds in the name of and upon the credit of said city, in the aggregate principal sum of seventeen thousand, five hundred dollars (\$17,500), said bonds to be designated "Funding Bonds," to be dated April 1, 1917, due April 1, 1927, redeemable in numerical order, in equal annual amounts, as near as may be, commencing April 1, 1928, and bear interest at a rate not to exceed six (6) per centum per annum, payable semi-annually April 1 and October 1, for the purpose of cancelling, paying and redeeming said outstanding, due and unpaid warrant indebtedness, together with said interest thereon to the date of payment of said warrants, and provide for the levy and collection of a direct annual ad valorem tax upon all the taxable property in said city, in addition to all other taxes, sufficient to create a fund with which to pay the interest on said bonds and the principal thereof promptly when and as the same become due, and authorize and direct the exchange of said bonds, dollar for dollar, for a like amount of said warrant indebtedness and the interest thereon, or the sale thereof by the common council at public or private sale, upon such terms and in such manner as may be deemed to be the best interests of the city, and without further authorization by the voters of the city; and repeal all parts of the charter in conflict with said Section 22 of Chapter XXI?
