

**EARLY BEND INVESTOR  
DIES IN PORTLAND**

W. E. Guerin Passes Suddenly at  
Daughter's Home—Was President  
of Deschutes I. & P. Co.

William Estil Guerin died Thursday morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. James M. Coghlan, wife of Dr. Coghlan, 185 North 25th street, following an attack of acute ailment of the lungs only a few minutes before.

Mr. Guerin came to Seattle from Columbus, Ohio, in 1899, where he had been president and actively identified with the Columbus, Sandusky & Hoeking Valley Railroad company for many years. There he became interested in the Seattle, San Francisco Railroad & Navigation company. The central Oregon country attracted his attention, and he accepted the presidency of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power company, and became an important factor in the upbuilding of Bend and the development of Central Oregon, attracting investments of capital and the interest of capable men of known ability and enterprise.

In 1913, Mr. Guerin retired from active affairs, and thereafter resided with his daughter in this city. Mr. Guerin was born in 1847 in Michigan, and was active in business affairs and railroad financing and management early in his career.

Funeral services at the residence in this city will be held on Friday afternoon, and the body will be taken to Columbus, Ohio, for interment. His daughter will accompany the body.

Mr. Guerin is survived by the following children: Mrs. J. M. Coghlan, of Portland; W. E. Guerin, of Cleveland; R. F. Guerin, Seattle; Dr. J. T. Guerin, Seattle. Henry F. Guerin, of Columbus, is a brother.

Mr. Guerin had been in Bend as recently as December, 1916, and had spent a part of the winter at Alfalfa. Coming here with his son, W. E. Guerin, Jr., in 1904, he was associated with him in the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Co., a forerunner of the C. O. I. Co., being vice president of that corporation, and was also interested in the telephone, bank and ranch properties.

Mercy, of Bend, Oregon, Contestor: You are hereby notified that Thorp Elleff, who gives Bend, Oregon, as his post office address, did on February 19, 1917, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your homestead, Entry No. 51228, Serial No. 012289, made December 1, 1913, for W/2 Section 15, Township 20 South, Range 17 East, Willamette Meridian, and so grounds for his contest be alleged that Alfred L. Mercy has wholly abandoned said claim for more than six months last past, and has never since the date of filing, reseeded upon or cultivated said tract; that said aborigine from said land was not due to his employment in military service rendered in connection with operations in Mexico, or along the borders thereof, or

in mobilization camps elsewhere, in the military or naval organizations of the United States, or the National Guard of any of the several states.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken by this office as having been confessed by you, and your said entry will be canceled thereunder without your further right to be heard therein, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically meeting and responding to these allegations of contest, or if you fail within that time to file in this office *in proof* that you have served a copy of your notice on the said contestant either in person, or by registered mail. If this service is made by registered mail, a copy of your answer to the contestant in person, proof of such service must

be either the said contestant's written acknowledgment of his receipt of the copy, showing the date of its receipt, or the affidavit of the person by whom the delivery was made stating when and where the copy was delivered; if made by registered mail, proof of such service must consist of the affidavit of the person by whom the copy was mailed, stating when and the post office to which it was mailed, and this affidavit must be accompanied by the postmaster's receipt for the letter.
