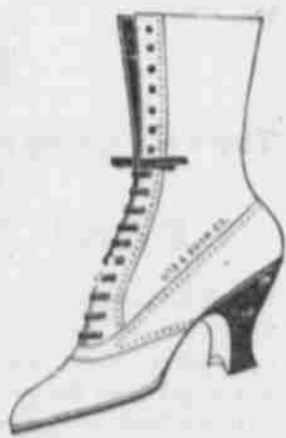
A. B. Taylor left for Prineville today to start work on a contract he has secured on the railroad grade.

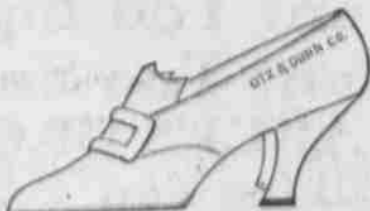
