II. CLEARING HOUSE FOR NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL RELIEF The American Red Cross will gladly furnish information as to the standing of all Relief Agencies collecting money from the publie for national and international relief.

The Local Red Cross Chapter should appoint a Committee strong enough to be recognized by the community so that in case of local disaster decisive action may be commenced at once. PREPAREDNESS.

To equip Base Hospitals for the Army and Navy.

To secure highest class professional personnel, Doctors and Nurses. To secure non-professional personnel; Ambulance Drivers, Litter Bearers, Chauffeurs, Clerks, Cooks, Stenographers, Porters, Mechanics, Shipping Clerks, Pharmacists, Etc. To make surgical dressings and hospital garments.

To care for soldiers' families that will need special assistance during time of mobilization or war.
