

LARGEST CLASS TO LEAVE HIGH

WILL GET DIPLOMAS ON MAY 25,

Rev. W. C. Stewart Chosen to Deliver Baccalaureate Sermon—Economy in Dress Is Watchword of the Class of 1917.

Bend high school will graduate the largest class in the history of the institution on the evening of Friday, May 25, when 12 girls and five boys now completing the four year course, will receive their diplomas. The senior class for each of the last two years has numbered 12, and from the size of the lower classes, Principal Bolt predicts a steady growth in the number of graduates each year for the next three years at least.

Rev. W. C. Stewart, pastor of the Methodist church, has been chosen to give the baccalaureate sermon on Sunday evening, May 20, at the high school auditorium. Five evenings later, also at the auditorium, Dr. George B. Van Waters, Episcopal missionary for Central Oregon, will deliver the commencement address.

The graduation program will consist in addition, of the presentation of diplomas, medals and the awarding of honors, the recipients of the last two being kept secret until

commencement night. A piano solo by F. S. Francis, a vocal trio by Dorothy Miller, Marie Brosterhous, and Mary Linster, and selections by the girls' glee club will be other features of the evening. Other numbers are still unannounced. The program is to start promptly at 8:15 o'clock.

Economy Agreed On.

Both boys and girls in the class are doing their part in war economy. City School Superintendent F. Thorndarson, class advisor, states, and a lower cost than the average price of graduation apparel has been fixed by the class as the maximum for any individual in the class to spend for this purpose.

BARBERS PASS NEW SCHEDULE

SHAVES, TONICS AND MASSES RAISED, HOURS SYSTEMATIZED AND GUARANTEES FOR EMPLOYEES PROVIDED.

Meeting with their employes last night, proprietors of Bend barber shops decided on a new rate card to keep pace with constantly increasing expenses, and fixed uniform hours and guarantees for their men. REASONS FOR A RED CROSS CHAPTER IN EVERY COMMUNITY.

- I.—HUMANITARIAN.
 1. In case of local disaster which paralyzes other relief agencies in the locality.
 2. In case of National Disaster.
 3. Relief for wounded and non-combatants on both sides of any war. (Red Cross Neutrality.)
 4. In case of disaster elsewhere.
- II. CLEARING HOUSE FOR NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL RELIEF.

The American Red Cross will gladly furnish information as to the standing of all Relief Agencies collecting money from the public for national and international relief.

The Local Red Cross Chapter should appoint a Committee strong enough to be recognized by the community so that in case of local disaster decisive action may be commenced at once.
- III. PREPAREDNESS.
 1. To equip Base Hospitals for the Army and Navy.
 2. To secure highest class professional personnel, Doctors and Nurses. To secure non-professional personnel; Ambulance Drivers, Litter Bearers, Chauffeurs, Clerks, Cooks, Stenographers, Porters, Mechanics, Shipping Clerks, Pharmacists, Etc.
 3. To make surgical dressings and hospital garments.
 4. To care for soldiers' families that will need special assistance during time of mobilization or war.
- IV. CONSERVATION OF HUMAN LIFE.
 1. To educate the public in First Aid, Home Care of the Sick, Dietetics, and Water Life Saving.
 2. To serve and instruct by our town and country Nursing Service.

IMPORTANT—Red Cross Magazine is not included in the \$1 membership.

The money retained by the Chapter, in accordance with this schedule, may be used to purchase sewing material, and to defray such other expenses, which, in the judgment of the Executive Committee, may be necessary to properly conduct the affairs of the Chapter.

Any town of 5000 inhabitants may form a Chapter. Chapter town requested to co-operate through auxiliaries with smaller towns within its territories. Bend Chapter territory includes Crook, Jefferson and Deschutes Counties.

Auxiliaries elect Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer. Auxiliaries work to harmonize with Chapter work. All dues forwarded to Chapter of which the Auxiliary receives its share for administrative purposes.

National authority to form Auxiliary may be obtained by application to Secretary of Bend Chapter, American Red Cross.

from 15 to 25 cents, incorporating however, the neck shave, itself a five cent item. Any massage will cost 50 cents straight, instead of ranging from 35 to 50 cents, and shampoos will cost two-bits, or \$1, according to the kind. This charge has already been in effect, but the dollar shampoo has not been listed on the cards. The application of tonics will be 15 cents, instead of 10 and 15 cents as formerly.

For the employes, a \$16 a week guarantee will go into effect, with a daily commission of 60 per cent of business running over \$26. For work on Saturday alone a \$5 guarantee is made.

All shops will open at 7 o'clock in the morning and close at 8 o'clock in the evening, with the exception of Saturdays and paydays, when the hours will be from 7 to 10. To prevent any possible evasion of this ruling, it was decided that no curtains shall be used on the shop windows.
