

# OLD CITY DEBT IS DISPOSED OF

## LAST ORDINANCE FOR BONDS PASSES.

Officials Sign Refunding Note—Improvement of Newport Avenue to Cost \$19,870—Sprinkling Ordinance Goes Through.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

With dinner time rapidly approaching, members of the Bend city council stood aghast this morning, when a 30 page ordinance came up for first reading, and after a few pages had been heard, the balance was passed over on the declaration of City Attorney Benson and Recorder H. C. Ellis, that they had read the bill and had found nothing to criticize in it. The ordinance, introduced by P. A. Gilmore, of Keeler Bros., bond dealers, and constituting the last step to be taken by the council in disposing of the city's \$16,500 warrant indebtedness in exchange for city bonds, was passed, and the bonds were signed by the city officers this afternoon.

When Newport avenue is improved from the Deschutes to the city limits, it will cost \$19,870.40, according to an estimate submitted by City Engineer Robert B. Gould. As a petition for the grading and widening of the road has been in for some time, the council authorized the tak-

ing of the next step specified by the city law for starting the proposed work. Mr. Gould's statement was accepted.

Either oil or water, according to the preference of property owners on a given street may be used to lay the dust in Bend this summer, is the provision made in an ordinance introduced by the street committee, and passed with little discussion. The ordinance gives the council power to make levies on property to pay for such sprinkling, instead of using the old subscription plan.

The council passed a sanitation ordinance governing scavenger work, and other matters which were suggested, chiefly along the street improvement line, were held over until the next meeting.

City officials present were Mayor S. C. Caldwell, Recorder H. C. Ellis, Attorney C. S. Benson, and Councilmen John Steidl, Clyde McKay, Louis Bennett, A. Edwards, C. V. Silvis and E. P. Brosterhaus.

# SNAPPY GAME WON BY BEND

## MILL MEN DEFEATED BY 2-1 SCORE.

Wild Pitches by Dieters in Seventh Bring in Winning Tallies—Ash Houston, Hurt in Workout, Plays on the Bench.

Two wild pitches by Dieters, in the box for Shevlin-Hixon, helped Bend to beat the lumbermen by a score of 2 to 1 yesterday. It was the seventh inning that went bad for the S.-H. twirler with three men on.

Yesterday's game was one that the fans like to witness. The weather had much to do with it. The game was snappy and went without the customary caterwauling.

Bend was held scoreless, with Dieters pitching good ball and allowing only two hits up to that time, and they were kept well scattered through the innings. In the seventh Clow walked and O'Donnell hit to Baker on the second base line, and Clow was caught, Baker to Shoots. Lynch went on by H. P. B. and O'Donnell came in on Dieters' wild pitch. Davis walked and also came in on a bad pitch by Dieters.

### Errors Are Few.

Merrill held the mill men to one hit up to the sixth inning. Shoots got on through Clow's bad handling of an easy grounder and stole second. Baker landed safely on first when Davis badly managed an easy throw, but was caught when Bullock came up to bat and with three balls and two strikes on him tried to steal home on Merrill, but was caught at the plate by Johnson. Boland struck out and Dieters hit into the outfield scoring Shoots.

Notwithstanding this bad inning, Dieters gave the best of the Bend stickers cause for much worry, allowing only three stingy little hits, in the second, third and ninth innings. Merrill, too, kept the millites' clouts well scattered, allowing only four in as many innings. Merrill struck out 12 and Dieters 13 men.

Bend is still weak on fielding, and in this particular the first sack was particularly effete, Davis having three errors chalked up against him and Clow is discredited with two errors. Aside from the two wild pitches by Dieters, the S.-H. crowd kept the mishaps on their column down to a single bad move.

Houston was out of yesterday's game, due to a mishap before the game started. In workout a bat was broken, a splintered end striking him in the leg severely cutting it.

Al. Davis, recently arrived in Bend from San Francisco, gave excellent service as umpire, speeding up the teams until the game finished an hour and a half earlier than the one played the Sunday previous on the local grounds. The score:

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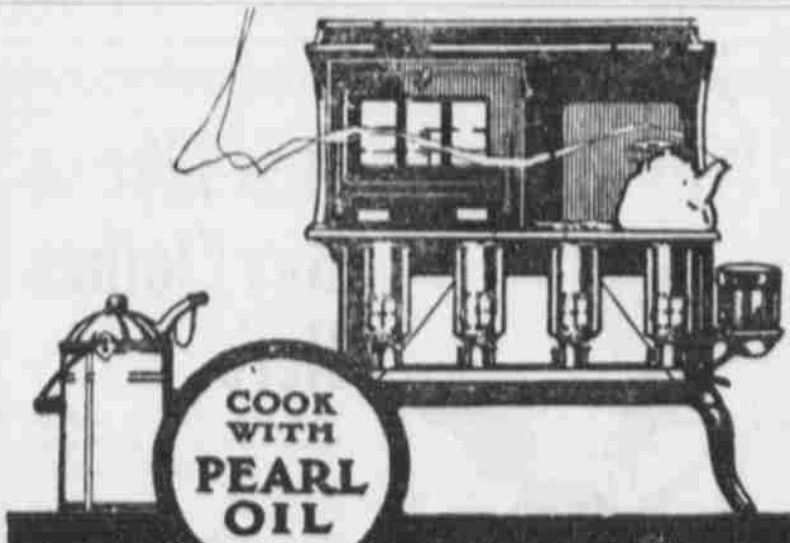
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
