**NOTICE OF CONTEST.**

Department of the Interior, United States Land Office, The Dalles, Oregon, May 1, 1917.  
To Alfred L. Mery, of Bend, Oregon, Contestee: You are hereby notified that Thos. Ellett, who gives Bend, Oregon, as his post office address, did on February 18, 1917, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your homestead, Entry No. 11228, Serial No. 61228, made December 1, 1912, for W. Section 15, Township 28 South, Range 17 East, Willamette Meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that Alfred L. Mery has wholly abandoned said claim for more than six months, and has never since the date of filing, resided upon or cultivated said tract; that said absence from said land was not due to his employment in military service rendered in connection with operations in Mexico or along the border there, or in mobilization camps elsewhere, in the military or naval organizations of the United States, or the National Guard of one of the several states.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken by this office as having been confirmed by you, and your said entry will be cancelled thereupon without your further right to be heard therein, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically meeting and responding in these allegations of contest, or if you fail within that time to file in this office the proof that you have served a copy of your answer to the said contestant either in person or by registered mail. If this service is made by the delivery of a copy of your answer to the contestant in person, proof of such service must be either the said contestant's written acknowledgment of his receipt of the copy, showing the date of its receipt, or the affidavit of the person by whom the delivery was made stating when and where the copy was delivered; if made by registered mail, proof of such service must consist of the affidavit of the person by whom the copy was mailed stating when and where the post office to which it was mailed, and this affidavit must be accompanied by the postmaster's receipt for the letter.
