

BROWN DECIDES ELECTION POINT

OLDEST MEMBER OF BEND SCHOOL BOARD TO BE HELD OVER, AND TWO MEMBERS ELECTED, IN CHANGE.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

Settling the question as to the procedure at the annual school election to be held June 18, when Bend will be changed from a district of the second class to a first class district, a telegram was received yesterday afternoon by H. J. Overturf, clerk of the board, from J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of education. Attorney General Brown's decision as to the number of directors to be selected has been mailed, according to Mr. Churchill's wire, and will direct that two new directors be elected, and that the retiring member of the board be held over for another year.

This will mean the retention of R. M. Smith, whose term expires this year, or in case he should not desire the extended service, the choosing by the board of a successor.

The attorney general's decision removes all doubt as to the proper method of raising the membership of the board from three to five, and notices were being posted today announcing the election.

GIST WOMAN TRYING HAND AT RECRUITING

Mrs. Carlisle declares that she can get recruits that a man would have no chance of landing. She intended to start by persuading a brother living in Gist to join the army.

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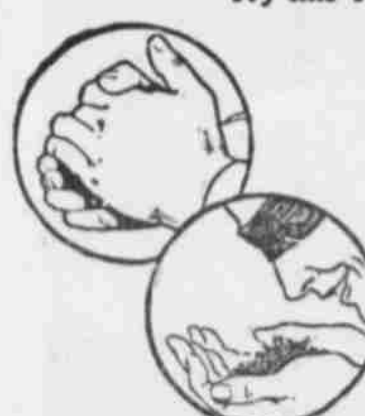
