

NEW TELEPHONE WORK STARTED

BEND'S PHONES WILL NUMBER 540.

New Pole Lines Will Accommodate 30 New Telephone Patrons—Second Extension Which Has Been Made This Spring.

(From Tuesday's Daily.)
Work began this morning on telephone line extension to accommodate 30 more Bend families, who have applied for phones. The work is being done under the direction of F. L. Ferguson, construction foreman, of Portland.
With the addition of these phones, over 540 phones will be in operation from the Bend office. The principal extensions will be made along Revere and East Norton avenues and on East Third street. Forty new lines have been installed in the Bend switchboard to accommodate the new phones, according to H. A. Wetterborg, wire chief of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company lines in this district. Due to the many new applications for service through the Bend office, this is the second time the construction crew has been called to Bend this year.
Mr. Ferguson brought four assistants with him from Portland and will employ seven local men, as soon as possible, to carry on the pole line construction.
