

# SAW MILL WILL BE OVERHAULED

PREPARATIONS BEING MADE FOR INSTALLATION OF PLANING MILL AT THE GARDNER-WILKINSON PLANT.

(From Friday's Daily.)

With the view to increasing the output nearly double the present capacity of the saw mill, and to shipping finished lumber from its plant, the saw mill of the Gardner-Wilkinson Lumber Company will be overhauled for the installation of machinery for a new planing mill which will have a daily capacity of 100,000 feet of lumber for two shifts. Two planers will be added to the present equipment, and A. J. Kroenert, who recently purchased the interests of R. R. Gardner, of Portland, says that he hopes that the new planing mill will be in operation in about three weeks.

To facilitate night operations at the plant, a complete lighting system will be installed in a short time for the mill yards and other buildings.

Mr. Kroenert has practically decided that the company will make use of two five-ton auto trucks, with trailers, to haul lumber from the mill to the point of shipping in Bend. The company will not begin shipping until after the planing mill is in operation.

Mr. Kroenert is working on the matter of the selection of a name for the corporation, which matter is now before the Secretary of State for his consideration.

# EVANGELIST IS TO COME BACK

ELWOOD LYON, HERE LAST WINTER, WILL BEGIN SIX WEEKS UNION SERVICES FOR BEND CHURCHES, OCTOBER 21.

Arrangements have been completed for the return of Rev. Elwood P. Lyon for six weeks' evangelistic work in Bend beginning October 21.

"Churches here are still feeling the benefits of Rev. Lyon's services here last January," said Rev. H. C. Hartman, of the Presbyterian church this morning. Rev. Lyon was in Bend for three weeks on his last visit and was accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. James, musicians. They will not return with Rev. Lyon next October.

The Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist and Scandinavian-Lutheran churches of Bend are co-operating in bringing Rev. Lyon here for the union services. A temporary balcony will be put in the Presbyterian church, where the meetings are to be held.

# COUNTIES TO HAVE FINAL SETTLEMENT

The final step in cutting Deschutes county away from old Crook will be

taken Monday when the final settlement of property and liabilities is to be made at Prineville.

"The Crook county court house and the county high school buildings located in Prineville and valued at \$85,000 in the Crook-Jefferson county settlement, will, I believe, more than offset the county indebtedness at the time of division last January," said H. H. De Armond, district attorney, this morning.

Deschutes county is at the present time out of debt. Settlement will be made at a joint meeting of the two county courts.

# COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Bend, Oregon, June 6, 1917.—The County Court met in the council room in the O'Kane building, at 10 a. m., all members being present. The meeting was called to order by the Judge.

George Young, A. F. Ramey and Fred B. Wilson were appointed to view the proposed Jaeger road, on Friday, June 8, 1917.

Petition for the proposed Dayton road was presented, referred to the district attorney and approved by him as to form. It was ordered that a board of viewers, consisting of George Young, Frank May and S. R. Hogan, be appointed to meet Monday, June 11, and view the proposed road.

Petition for the proposed Orcutt road was presented, referred to the district attorney, and approved by him, as to form. Ordered, that a board of viewers consisting of George Young, A. F. Ramey and Fred B. Wilson, be appointed to meet Tuesday, June 12, and view the proposed road.

Ordered that claims No. 321 to 329, inclusive, as shown on pages 13 and 14 of the docket of claims, be and the same are hereby allowed, and the clerk is instructed to issue his warrants in payment thereof.

On motion, duly made and seconded, court adjourned to meet Friday, June 8, 1917.

Bend, Oregon, June 8, 1917.—The County Court met in the council room in the O'Kane building, at 10 a. m., all members being present. The meeting was called to order by the Judge.

The County Judge and Commissioners went to look at the city hospital building, east of Bend, with the matter of remodeling it for the county hospital, a petition having been presented by the City Council of Bend. No action was taken on same at this time, and it was left for further discussion.

The County Court also viewed the road north of Bend, at the crossing of the C. O. I. Company canal, with special reference to the sharp curve at that point.

Court adjourned at 12 M., to meet at 1:30 p. m., same date.

The Court reconvened at 1:30 p. m., same date, meeting in the council room, same members present as at morning meeting.

After further discussion regarding the road north of Bend, at the crossing of the C. O. I. Canal, it was ordered that the county surveyor be instructed to prepare a map and detail showing the present road at the sharp curve, and sloping the bluff in order to give a better view of the road at this point.

The matter of county hospital was again discussed, but no decision made in regard to same.

Ordered that claims No. 400 to 475, inclusive, as shown on pages 15 and 16 of the docket of claims, be and the same are hereby allowed, and the clerk is instructed to issue his warrants in payment thereof.

On motion duly made and seconded, court adjourned to meet Friday, June 15, 1917.
