

BIG WOOL CLIPS GO FROM HERE

THE TOTAL TO BE HALF
MILLION POUNDS.

New Shippers Sending Clips In—Two
Cars Already Gone—Fleeces Run
Heavier Than Usual This
Year—Shearers Busy.

With several new wool shippers sending their clips through Bend, and the clip reported to be going about nine pounds to the sheep, considerably more than was expected, the wool shipments through Bend this season are estimated to exceed last year's clip by 50,000 pounds. This would make the total Bend clip between 450,000 and 500,000 pounds.

Estimates at this time, however, are more or less indefinite, as wool will not begin coming in in any considerable amount until next week. Up to this time only two cars have been shipped out and the clip of Alex Mackintosh, the first of the large producers to have his clip ready, is just beginning to be received at Bend.

It is Mr. Mackintosh's statement that the wool in the Bend territory is going heavier than was expected. His own clip, he states, was expected to go seven pounds to the sheep, but has been averaging nine pounds, a heavy clip. Mr. Mackintosh, together with O'Connor, Jamison and M. Saunders, is now shearing at the Powell pens south of Bend. They are handling between 10,000 and 12,000 sheep.

O. T. McKendree, and Karrison and Carroll are clipping 10,000 sheep in the Paulina Mountains country. Their clips are not yet coming in and no reports as to the extent have been received.

Other sheepmen are either shearing or preparing to begin within a few days. Operations have been held up for some time, due to the inability of sheepmen to secure men to carry on the work. The crew now shearing the Mackintosh sheep was brought in from Klamath Falls last week.

The largest contract signed this season was that made by W. W. Brown to Eisenmann Brothers, of Boston, for the delivery of his 100,000 pound clip at Bend. R. N. Stanfield has made smaller contracts through which he buys about 115,000 pounds.

Many of the small clips are being held for higher prices and may be shipped direct without contract. Much of the Bend wool so far sold, was contracted in March when the price was 37 and 38 cents. Wool is now bringing between 53 and 57 cents.

According to Mr. Mackintosh, there will be practically no female stock shipped out this season, all the sheep being put back on the range as soon as clipped.

Railroad men bear out the statement of Mr. Mackintosh, although 1200 sheep, including some lambs, have been bought and shipped out of Redmond to the Chicago market by R. N. Stanfield.

OVER SUBSCRIPTION TO
BE \$1000.00.

Red Cross Fund for Bend District Is
Already \$225 Over the Mark
—Women are Out Today
—Sisters Sends in \$298.

Red Cross money received this morning to the amount of \$250 put Bend on the upper side of her \$10,000 quota. Tumalo and La Pine had not yet been heard from up to noon today, and their contribution, as well as the \$500 expected to be raised in Bend today and tomorrow and the \$500 additional that is the mark of the Women's Red Cross membership committee, out today, will all go toward a big over-subscription for Bend district.

Subscriptions from the city of Bend alone this morning totaled \$8211.25 and will be increased by about \$1000 by the close of the Bend drive Monday evening. Sisters has sent in \$288, and Redmond has brought up her subscription to \$1500, according to word received here.

Two hundred dollars was raised in Bend this morning. The additional \$50, which made the grand total \$10,002.25 being received from R. N. Stanfield, as the result of the following telegram mailed to him several days ago: "Your damn sheep have eaten every lawn in Bend. Now what are you going to do for the Red Cross in Bend? H. J. Overturf, V. A. Forbes, Alex. Mackintosh, H. H. DeArmond."

YOUNG POWELL NOW RECRUIT "GENERAL"

All the Bend boys who left Tuesday were in the party entertained at the Hotel Portland. They were Howard Young, John Steidl, Robert Fulton, Ernest Dick, John Bates, Robert Hoover and Myron Powell, now "general" of recruits en route to Mare Island.

A. G. Powell, father of young Myron, has another son in the army.
