

WAR FIGURES EASY ON BEND

DRAFT CHANCE LESSENED BY BIG LIST

Draft, if Made by Census Reports, Will Give Bend Men Advantage of City's Growth—Cruik Not So Fortunate.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

Because of an estimate of county population based on census figures taken prior to the rapid development around Bend it is likely that Deschutes county will not be hard hit by the draft next month, in comparison with other Oregon counties, according to figures in the hands of Sheriff S. E. Roberts, chairman of the registration board of the county, which is also to have charge of the drafting for military service.

The estimates made by the census bureau place the probable number of conscriptable men in Deschutes county at 385. Total registration figures, including those who registered after the official registration day, show Deschutes county to have 310 men between the ages of 21 and 31, and available for military service.

According to a previous announcement of the government, conscription will be based on census figures, and if this is continued as the government policy, as it seems very likely it will, Deschutes county will have to raise only about 50 per cent of the number that would be required if the draft was regulated by registration.

The government regulation that draft should be made according to census was made some time ago, so that it would be worth while for men of military age to report slackers who had not registered; as by the census method the same number would be drafted regardless of the number of registrations.

RED CROSS FUND IS SUBSCRIBED

BEND MEETS ITS ALLOTMENT.

Additions to Come in Still From Rest of County—Redmond and Sisters Report—Other Sections Still to Be Heard From.

Bend's committee in charge of the local Red Cross drive did effective preliminary work when it drafted local business and professional men into the service to give their financial aid to raising Bend's quota of \$7000. The sea was charted as if by expert mariners, and the Red Cross campaign ship yesterday sailed safely by the shoals it was expecting to strike, without apparent difficulty.

Bend's total subscription to the fund to date has reached \$6801, a jump of \$1280 over the total reported yesterday. The work will continue today in the business section of the town where the committee is generally being received with donations of the amount that the committee designated on the lists prepared before the campaign was started.

Sisters Reports.

Sisters is the first town in Deschutes county to report to the central committee with the progress of its work. Through John Dennis, who is actively engaged in the drive in the northwestern part of the county, it is reported that \$278 has been subscribed there and that there is every reason to believe that the \$400

Consequently it is probable that a very much greater percentage of registered men will be conscripted there than will be the case in Deschutes county. Crook county, in a measure, is in the same predicament with Multnomah. She registered but 400 while the government has them estimated as able to raise 448, if 100 per cent were conscripted.

PORTLAND, June 26—Totals compiled up to noon today showed that Oregon has raised well over \$1,000,000 for the Red Cross fund. Although the campaign formally ended last night, the money is still coming in.
