

COMMISSION HAS FAITH IN COURT WILL IMPROVE TROUT FISHING

MONEY FOR LA PINE ROAD READY.

County Commissioners Intrusted With Spending of \$17,000 Appropriation, Writes State Highway Engineer.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

That the road building organization brought into being by the Deschutes county court is fully capable of improvement of the Bend-La Pine road, involving the expenditure of \$17,000 just appropriated for the purpose by the State Highway commission, is the opinion expressed in a letter received this morning by County Clerk J. H. Haner addressed to the court and written by Herbert Nunn, state highway engineer.

The money appropriated is now on deposit, Mr. Nunn's letter states, and the only work of the commission in regard to the improvement will be the fact that the highway engineer will act as general adviser, while a timekeeper representing the commission will keep track of the force account. Equipment for use on the work will have to be purchased by the county, Mr. Nunn states.

The court expects to take up the matter at its next meeting, July 5, when preliminary points bearing on the early beginning of the work on the highway will be brought up.

WHITE FISH TO BE SEINED FROM BIG RIVER TO PREVENT INROADS ON SPAWN—METOLIUS IS WELL FISHED OUT.

John Cunningham, deputy game warden, stated this morning that it was probable that Big River would be seined this year to get rid of the white fish in that stream. White fish, he states, are very numerous this year and are doing much damage to trout fishing because of their living on trout spawn. Mr. Cunningham has taken the matter up with R. E. Clanton, master warden, who is stationed at Bonneville. Big River has never before been seined.

"Central Oregon fishing is steadily improving with the passing of high water," states Mr. Cunningham. "The Metolius has been the only river not effected with high water, with the result that that stream is already well fished out. Best fishing from this time on will be in the streams above Bend and in the group of small lakes lying beyond Blue and Suttle, which are not yet opened to fishing because of deep snows."

WAR DRAFT BOARD FINISHES QUICKLY

The work of the board is now finished for the time being, nothing more remaining to be done until the receipt of further orders.

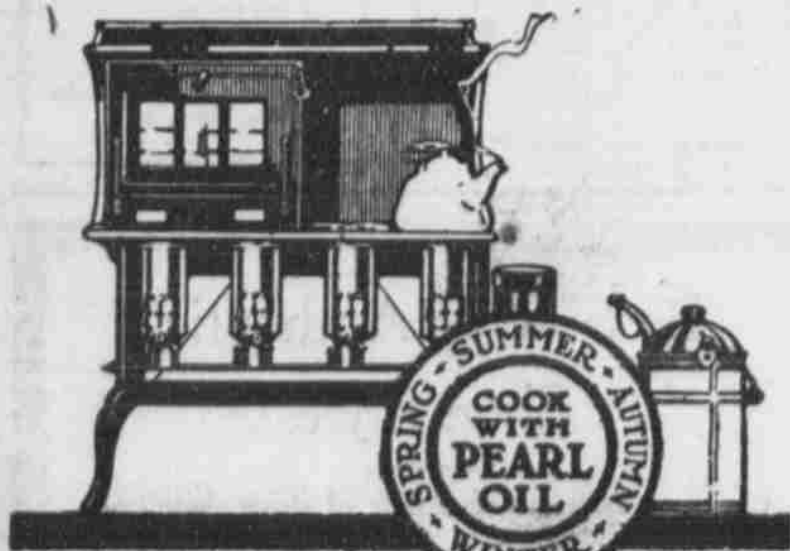

WOOL HELD FOR 75 CENT PRICE

SILVER LAKE RANCHERS HAVE SMALL QUANTITY STILL ON HAND, IS REPORT—SHEARING IS UNUSUALLY LATE.

What little wool remains to be sold in the Silver Lake country is being held for 75 cents a pound, according to reports received here today. Ranchers are confident that this price will be reached, in view of the 72-cent quotation recently made in the Portland market.

Clips are being rapidly shipped out of Central Oregon, a large proportion of the shearing having already been finished. A few stockmen have still to put their flocks through the shearing plants, but losses from shedding have been eliminated by keeping the animals in the higher ranges, avoiding the warmer weather of the lower country.

SPAWN AND FRY BROUGHT TO BEND

The remaining 200,000 spawn of the Odell Lake fish hatchery and storage are being brought to Bend to be placed in the Bend hatchery, bringing the total of spawn at the Bend hatchery up to 370,000. The Bend hatchery opened for the season last Monday and is in charge of Pearl Lynes, under Deputy Warden Cunningham.

This week a whole carload of small fish is being shipped here from the Bonneville hatchery. These trout will number close to 500,000 and will be placed in the fish ponds near the Bend hatchery until they are ready to be transferred to the lakes and streams of Central Oregon.

FUNERAL HELD TODAY FOR CYRUS FARRAND

After suffering for the past three years from cancer of the stomach, Cyrus H. Farrand, aged 43, died at 8:20 o'clock last night at the home of his brother, Frank Farrand, in Kenwood. A daughter and a nephew in Bend also survive him.

Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock this afternoon from the Niswonger undertaking parlors, Rev. H. C. Hartranft, of the Presbyterian church, officiating. Interment was made in Pilot Butte cemetery.

INVASION BY SHEEP IS NOW NEARLY DUE

National Forest Range Will Be Ready July 15—Impartial Apportionments for Grazing.

Within a few days sheep will begin pouring into Bend from Maupin and Shaniko, by rail, for summer range on the national forest. Supervisor W. G. Hastings of the Deschutes forest announced this morning, following a conference with J. W. Fisher and J. E. Hinton, of Shaniko. These two, with T. A. Connolly, of Maupin, will send in 15,000 head of sheep within the next 10 days, for the range will be ready by July 15.

A new apportionment of range has been made, according to which each stockman having grazing privileges will have some of the lower range in his apportionment.

RECRUITING WORK IS GIVEN PRAISE

Postmaster Henry B. Ford Instructed to Continue Enlisting as Many More Men Must Be Had.

Expressing his thanks for the manner in which Postmaster Henry B. Ford has assisted in recruiting men for the United States navy, J. P. Hart, in charge of the Portland central recruiting office, has written to Mr. Ford asking that there be no letup in the work, as there are still thousands of vacancies.

The letter emphasizes that no men under 21 or over 31 who have applied for enlistment will be accepted unless they can show registration cards. Enlistment will also not be permitted after an individual has been called by draft.

Increases in pay for navy enlisted men running from \$6 to \$15 a month, are now in effect.
