

Committee Criticises Conditions at School; Meeting Plan Carries

(From Saturday's Daily.)

Conditions in the old high school building as regards cleanliness, fire protection, and toilet facilities are to be improved by the district, it was decided last night at a special meeting of the school board. The action will be the result of a committee report revealing a deplorable state of affairs, which the directors decided should be immediately remedied. The committee, composed of R. W. Sawyer and Carl Johnson, was originally named to consider the painting of three rooms in the school, but their investigation led further, and filthy lavatories, tangled and, in one instance, rotted fire hose, came to their attention. In connection with the disclosures made, Mr. Johnson recommended that a permanent committee on school property be named, and he was selected chairman, with J. Edward Larson and Mr. Sawyer as associates.

In explaining the conditions found at the old building, F. Thordarson, city superintendent, stated that the responsibility rested with Eric Bolt,

as principal during the past year. Mr. Bolt has been away from Bend for several weeks, having resigned to engage in army Y. M. C. A. work.

The matter of engaging instructors for the coming year was brought up, and Mr. Thordarson entered a plea that his recommendation be considered necessary in hiring new teachers. He declared that he considered the securing of trained teachers of much more importance than maintaining proper toilet conditions, evinced his preference for Normal graduates rather than for university trained men and women, and asserted that he would deposit a \$1000 bond to guarantee the raising of the efficiency of the Bend educational system to 80 per cent if his plan were followed. Its present efficiency, he said, is about 25 per cent.

His suggestion was not accepted by the board, but Clerk H. J. Overturn was authorized to communicate with Henry M. Grant, of Wallula, Washington, and Miss Veronica Cane, of La Pine, applicants for positions in the schools, that the board would

be glad to have personal interviews with them.

To make possible closer supervision by the directors, it was decided that regular meetings of the board and the city instructors should be held, the first being set for the close of the first week of school.

Contractors' bonds for the second unit of the high school were submitted and accepted.

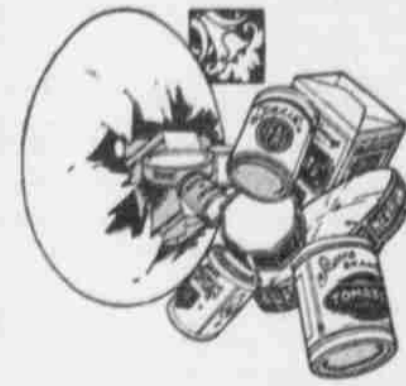
