GIVE COMPLETE FIRE PROTECTION

15 NEW HYDRANTS FOR CITY ORDERED.

Five Avenue Property Ordered Sold by City Council—Police Given Raise to Meet H. C. of L.—Errors in Old Bills Found.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)
Bend is to have complete fire protection in all parts of the city, according to action taken by the city council last night, when on the recommendation of Chief of Police Nixon, the installation of 15 new hydrants was ordered at points approved by Chief Nixon and T. H. Foley, manager of the Bend Water, Light & Power Company. The hydrants will be so distributed, Chief Nixon said, as to command all parts of Bend not already afforded protection from fire. The expense will amount to \$22.50 a month, the rental charged by the water company.

The long delayed matter of the straightening of Fir avenue was brought into the limelight once more, and on the report of City Recorder Ellis that the Bend school board had refused to pay its share of the assessment for the improvement, and that D. E. Hunter, representing non-resident property owners, refused to pay up until the school district had discharged its obligation, City Attorney Benson was authorized to take steps toward the sale of the property involved. The contention of the school board in the case is that no payment should be made until the work of straightening the avenue is accomplished, while the city, in turn, is unable to perform this work until the necessary funds have been contributed by owners of the property benefiting.

Police Given Raise.

The petition submitted by Chief of Police Nixon last month asking for a raise in salary for himself and his assistant, Frank Kulp, because of the advance in the cost of living, was granted, effective for July, the chief to receive \$115 instead of \$100 as formerly, while Officer Kulp's salary was boosted from \$90 to \$100 per month.

The need for securing a uniform discount rate for city warrants at the banks was discussed, it being pointed out that not only did the discount often run as high as 10 per cent, but that in addition, the warrant would draw interest on its face value at 6 per cent, a total of 16 per cent on the transaction for the purchaser.

Eleven Arrests in Month.

The report of City Treasurer Miss M. E. Coleman was read, showing a total of \$12,045 unpaid bills to date against the city. The report of Police Chief Nixon showed 10 arrests for drunkenness in July, with one arrest for furnishing others with intoxicants. He reported only one fire for the month.

A petition for the installation of a light at the intersection of Roanoke and West Fifth street, was allowed, and the request of the Cent. Ore. Motor Co. to be allowed to install a gasoline tank was granted. The petition for a fire hydrant at the corner of Aubrey road and West First street was referred to the fire committee.

The request of H. Dreyfus, of Salem, to be allowed to erect an auctioneer's platform within the city fire limits and to operate a permanent auction business at a yearly license of \$100, was referred to the committee on licenses.

The report of Accountant Max Crandall, who has just finished experting the city books, was referred to the committee on ways and means. Mr. Crandall stated that he had found a number of errors indicating that several fairly large accounts had been paid two or three times each.

City officials present at the meeting were Mayor S. C. Caldwell, City Recorder H. C. Ellis, City Attorney C. S. Benson, City Engineer Robert B. Gould, Chief of Police L. A. W. Nixon, and Councilmen Clyde McKay, A. Edwards, E. P. Bresterhouse, Louis Bennett and C. V. Slivis.

10 ARE PASSED FOR THE DRAFT

LIKE NUMBER FAIL IN DESCHUTES COUNTY.

Rejected Ones Must Take Second Examinations—Claims for Exemption Total 20—150 May Be Examined to Fill Quota.

As a semi-final step in the calling of the first draft from Deschutes county for the National army, 20 young men were given physical examinations this morning by Dr. B. Ferrell, in the presence of the other members of the conscription board, Sheriff S. E. Roberts and County Clerk J. H. Haner, and of this number 10 were declared ineligible because of physical disabilities of one kind or another. Those who failed in the examinations were to be given a second test later in the afternoon by Dr. U. C. Coe, in order that no question might be attached to the rejection.

Already 20 claims for exemption have been filed with the board, the chief reasons given being that the drafted men have near relatives depending on them for support. Eight claims were filed this morning, and when the balance of the 74 who are called to make up Deschutes county's quota of 37 appear for examination tomorrow and Wednesday, it is believed that as many more claims will be presented. Dr. Ferrell is of the opinion that 150 men will have to be examined before the full quota on the first call can be made up, allowing for exemptions and rejections for physical disability.

Two From Out of State.

Those accepted this morning were: Ralph J. Hyland, Galen Johnson, Victor A. McKelfresh, Kenneth E. Sawyer, Charles J. Dugan, Lyle M. Richardson, Forrest H. Miller, Chester Irvin Moore, James A. Blackstone and Ralph B. Sturdivan.

The rejected ones, who were listed for re-examination are Arthur Fuller, Archie D. Pepin, Angel A. Peterson, Percy C. Finley, Roy A. Branton, Joseph T. Beesley, Nicholas Zeiser, Arthur W. Spears, Charles J. Monahan and Wilfield E. Huson. Huson is from Washington while Finley is from California. They took their examinations here by special permission.

Causes for rejection were chiefly defective vision or hearing, misshapen feet, and varicose veins. One man was thrown out as being under weight.

That Bend and Deschutes county are giving returns for the draft far above the average was shown this morning when Dr. B. Ferrell, Sheriff S. E. Roberts, and County Clerk J. H. Haner, members of the examining board, passed 13 out of 21 men who were called on the first draft. With 10 passed yesterday, and one of the rejected ones of yesterday's list, Archie D. Pepin, who was later accepted by Dr. U. C. Coe, the total of physically eligible men is 24, out of 41 examined, a little better than 50 per cent. Seventeen more must be accepted before the county's quota will be filled, and then it is estimated that at least half of the men accepted will be among the exemption claimants.

COUNTY WILL DO ROAD WORK NOW

BEND-LA PINE BIDS REJECTED.

State Highway Commission Authorizes Deschutes County Court to Handle Expenditure of the \$17,000 Apportioned.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 8.—(Special to The Bulletin.)—All bids opened here yesterday by the State Highway Commission were rejected. The lowest were practically three times the amount appropriated for the local work, \$17,000.

The very strict specifications, requiring laying the cinders with water and mixing clay with them, which could be met under the circumstances only at great cost, are responsible for the high bidding.

The commission has authorized the county court of Deschutes county to proceed with the work on force account, utilizing the \$17,000 as far as it will go. County Judge Barnes and Commissioner Smith were present.

The Bulletin has received a telegram from Judge Barnes in which he says the county court intends to take up the work immediately, now that the state authorities have authorized it. He and Commissioner Smith are buying an auto truck today and other required equipment will be secured as promptly as possible.

SQUAW CREEK RATE RAISED

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION ALLOWS THE COMPANY TO INCREASE WATER CHARGE TO SIXTY CENTS.

(From Wednesday Daily.)
The Public Service Commission has allowed an increase in water rates on the Squaw Creek irrigation project from 35 cents per acre foot to 60 cents per acre foot. The company sought an increase to \$1.00 per acre foot.

H. H. De Armond and V. A. Forbes represented the settlers. The testimony at the hearings, it is said, brought out the fact that the lands could stand about \$1.00 per acre for water without hardship. As it takes about two acre feet to properly irrigate, the cost per acre under the new schedule will be about \$1.20. Under the figure set by the company and not allowed by the commission, the cost would be \$... per acre.

The commission ordered the company to set aside \$400 a year in a depreciation fund.
