

COUNTY COURT HAS ROAD WORK

WILL SAVE MONEY ON STATE HIGHWAY.

Engineering Expense Eliminated, and Local Labor Will Be Given Preference, on the Bend-La Pine Road, Says Judge Barnes.

The Deschutes county court will commence work on the Bend-La Pine road just as soon as equipment arranged for in Portland yesterday arrives. The state has turned the entire work, together with the \$17,000 state appropriation, over to the local officials.

County Judge Barnes and Commissioner Smith returned this morning from Salem and Portland, the latter going home to Redmond. Judge Barnes reports the lowest bid submitted for the work by the Warren Construction Company, amounting to \$47,810. The State Highway Commission turned down all bids, instructing the local court to do the work by force account.

Will Buy Truck.

Judge Barnes and Commissioner Smith have arranged for the purchase of a large auto truck and trailer, which will come in under its own power in about two weeks. After going over the matter with State Highway Engineer Nunn and other experts it was deemed far more economical to buy than to rent a truck, at the very high rental charged. Long time payments will be arranged and the county is protected against the constant increase in price of this class of equipment, which promises to continue. The truck's capacity, with trailer, will be 10 yards, with a speed of 12 miles.

Economy Watchword.

At the suggestion of Mr. Nunn, all outlay for engineering will be done away with. The court plans to devote every dollar to actual construction, eliminating overhead. Mr. Nunn

himself will come here to get the work started, and the secretary of the Highway Commission, G. Edward Ross, formerly of the Tumalo project, will come and install a book-keeping system. Some local men will act as timekeeper for the state.

Local labor will be used exclusively, says Judge Barnes. Clinkering will be started at Lava Butte, working toward Bend, so as to secure the advantage of the downhill haul for the loaded truck. The wide wheels of the truck, making the many trips over the material in place, will do its own rolling.

Judge Barnes says it is expected to work three shifts, if possible, and certainly two, so as to get the maximum returns from the truck. Probably about a dozen men will be employed.

The county court also adds that while the auto truck will be used for much of the work, special effort will be made to utilize as much team work as can be handled economically. Tests will be made, and if it is found that teams can give approximately as much in return for the funds expended, opportunity will be arranged for their use.

REDMOND OFFICIALS NAMED DEFENDANTS

Roberts, in an injunction suit brought by Mrs. Alda McMickle, of Redmond. The hearing will be before Circuit Judge T. E. J. Duffy in Prineville Wednesday.

In her petition for an injunction, Mrs. McMickle seeks to restrain the city of Redmond, and consequently the officials of the city, from removing a frame building which the officials complain is located within the city fire limits.

PREPARE COUNTY LIST OF JURORS

COUNTY COURT PICKS MEN TO SERVE AT THE FIRST CIRCUIT COURT SESSION—\$50 GIVEN FLOWER SHOW.

Although the jury list for the first term of circuit court in Deschutes county to be held next fall was partially made ready yesterday at the regular session of the county court, it will probably not be completed until next Tuesday, when an adjourned session of the court is scheduled. It will be the first circuit court jury list ever compiled in Deschutes county.

The court at its meeting yesterday considered the request of the Bend Flower Show committee for a subscription for prizes, and \$50 was appropriated for this purpose. On the suggestion of Judge W. D. Barnes, however, it was stipulated that the money should be used as awards only for classes of plants the cultivation of which would stimulate food production.

The opening of the Yaeger and Dayton roads was ordered by the court, and in the further consideration of road matters, the resignation of L. H. Root as supervisor in District No. 11 was accepted, and Fred B. Wilson named as his successor.

FLAG RAISING BIG SUCCESS.

Patriotic songs and addresses featured the celebration last night at Brooks-Scanlon Logging Camp No. 2, when ceremonies were held marking the raising of a huge American flag for the camp. A special train was run from Bend into the woods, allowing many from the city to be present at the demonstration, and in addition a large number attended from Camp No. 1. The flag-raising is the second within less than a month's time at the Brooks-Scanlon camps, the first being at Camp No. 1. J. P. Keyes, local superintendent of the Brooks-Scanlon interests, introduced the speakers of the evening.

State Representative Vernon A. Forbes, Judge J. A. Barnes, R. P. Munter, W. H. Inman, of Camp 1, and Captain Jessie Fulton, of Camp 2. Tributes to the flag and the spirit among the woodsmen prompting the evening's ceremonies were the themes chosen by the speakers, while Mr. Inman added remarks on the prosperity of Bend, declaring that he had travelled 1600 miles this spring before he had landed in Bend and decided that it was the best place to locate.

As the flag was flown, "The Star-Spangled Banner" was sung, and at the conclusion of the evening's ceremonies the singing of "America" signalled the lowering of the national emblem.

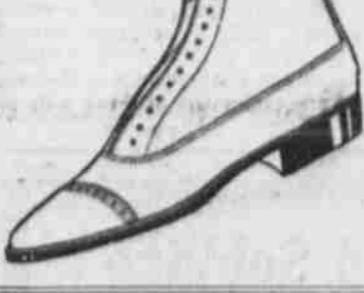
