

SWIFTS SELECT R. A. BLANCHARD

ENTIRE STATE WILL BE
TERRITORY.

County Agriculturalist to Work
Along Lines of Past Endeavor,
But on Larger Scale—Will
Be Often in Bend.

(From Monday's Daily.)
To take the position as state agriculturalist and livestock expert for the Swift interests in Oregon, R. A. Blanchard, for more than a year county agriculturalist, will leave his present position and take up his headquarters in North Portland with the Livestock State Bank. The announcement was made this morning by E. P. Mahaffey, of the Central Oregon Bank, just returned from Portland, where he attended the banquet given at the Benson hotel for representatives of the Swift companies and banks in Oregon. Mr. Mahaffey stated that a large part of Mr. Blanchard's work will be in Bend and vicinity, as one of the most important shipping and feeding centers in the state. His services will be at the disposal of ranchers at all times, Mr. Mahaffey states.

Bend's Importance Noted.
The securing of Mr. Blanchard was announced at the Swift banquet, at which the principal speakers were C. C. Colt, E. W. Rumble, W. P. Dickey, and C. B. Swift. Mr. Colt emphasized the importance of the packing industry in Portland, mentioning \$12,000,000 as the total business transacted by the Swift plants during the past year, while Mr. Rumble, of the Columbia Basin Wool Warehouse Co., stated that there is now more wool in Portland than in any other city in the United States. The company has handled \$5,000,000 in loans during the year, he said. Mr. Dickey advocated the building up of herds and the improving of stock conditions in the state, showing that in the last 12 months the Portland Cattle Loan Co. has aided ranchers to the extent of \$9,000,000.

Mr. Swift spoke on the importance of the interior country and mentioned Bend as the logical center for shipping and finishing stock.

More than 150 were present at the banquet.

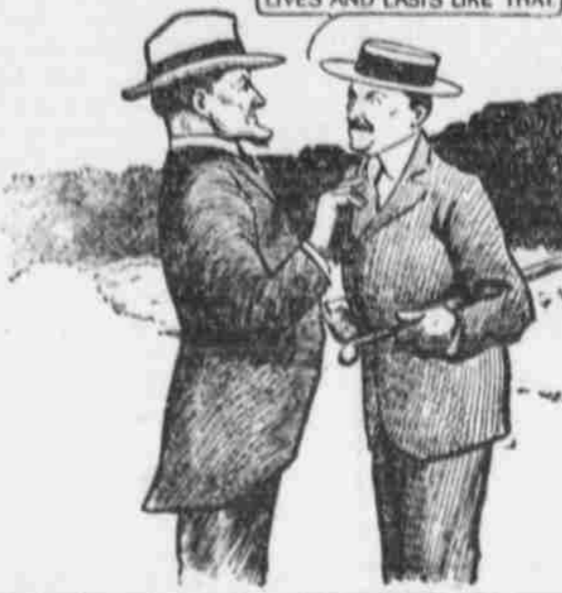
