

## COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Bend, Oregon, July 12, 1917.—The County Court met in the council room in the O'Kane building at 2:00 p. m., pursuant to adjournment, Judge Barnes and Commissioner Smith present.

The meeting was called to order by the county judge.

It was ordered that \$500 of the general fund be set aside for the general county road fund.

In the matter of the Dayton road: Ordered that the report of the board of viewers be adopted and the clerk be directed to issue a warrant to A. J. Harter in the sum of \$75 to be awarded from the general county road fund in payment of damages allowed in said report.

In the matter of the Orcutt road: Ordered that the report of the board of viewers be adopted, the petition be denied and the costs fixed at \$20.74.

In the matter of the Jaeger road: R. S. Towne having waived all claim to damages whatsoever on account of said road, it was ordered that the report of the board of viewers be adopted, and the clerk be directed to issue a warrant to C. H. House in the sum of \$57 on the general county road fund, in payment of damages awarded in said report.

No further business coming on for hearing at this time, court adjourned to meet on July 29, 1917.

July 20, 1917.—The County Court met in the council room in the O'Kane building, pursuant to adjournment, and no business coming up for consideration at this time, court adjourned.

August 1, 1917.—The regular meeting of the County Court of Deschutes county convened in the council room in the O'Kane building at 10:00 a. m. this date.

The following were present: County Judge W. D. Barnes, Commissioner L. E. Smith, Sheriff S. E. Roberts. The meeting was called to order by the county judge.

The matter of claims against the county coming up for consideration, it was ordered that Claims No. 615 to 628, inclusive, \$40 to \$43, inclusive, No. 645, No. 647 to \$54, inclusive, No. 656 to 663, inclusive, No. 665 to 676, inclusive, No. 667 to 683, inclusive, be and the same are hereby allowed and the clerk is instructed to issue his warrants in payment thereof.

On motion duly made and seconded, court adjourned to meet at 1:30 p. m.

Court reconvened at 1:30 p. m. this date, meeting at same place, and same members present as at morning meeting.

The matter of furniture for the assessor's office coming up for hearing, he was authorized to purchase the following:

One double desk \$104.00  
Standing desk 45.00  
One swivel chair 12.00

Total \$161.00

Concrete culvert forms: This matter coming on for hearing, and after discussion, it was ordered that a Whalen concrete culvert form be purchased from Howard-Cooper Corporation, at \$250 f. o. b. Portland, Oregon.

Ordered, that \$5000 be now appropriated for work on the Mackenzie Highway, to be used in conjunction with \$12,500 appropriated by the state, and \$12,500 by the U. S. Forestry Department, as contemplated in tentative orders on February 9, and March 7, 1917.

No further business coming up for consideration at this time, on motion duly made and seconded, court adjourned to meet Monday, August 6, 1917.

Bend, Oregon, August 6, 1917.—The County Court met in the council room at 10:00 a. m., pursuant to adjournment, County Judge Barnes and Commissioner Smith present. The meeting was called to order by the county judge.

The morning session was spent in preparing the jury list for the October term of circuit court.

On motion duly made and seconded, court adjourned to meet on the afternoon of the same date.

Court reconvened at 1:30 p. m. same members present as at morning meeting.

A committee representing the Bend Flower & Vegetable Show appeared before the court with a request for an appropriation to cover the premiums on food and vegetable exhibits. After discussion it was ordered that \$50 be appropriated for the purpose of paying premiums on exhibits which will be intended to stimulate food production or food conservation. The committee were advised that the organization would be required to submit a report on how the money was expended.

Ordered that the Jaeger road and the Dayton road be opened and that the respective supervisors in the districts in which the said roads are located be ordered to open said roads for travel.

L. H. Root having resigned as supervisor for road district No. 11, his resignation was accepted and F. B. Wilson was appointed in his stead.

No further business, on motion duly made and seconded, court adjourned to meet August 14, 1917.

The matter of claims against the county coming up for consideration, it was ordered that Claims No. 689 to 703, inclusive, be and the same are hereby allowed, and the clerk is instructed to issue his warrants in payment thereof.
