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SISTERS SAW MILL RESUMES ITS WORK

Trucks and Teams Will Be Busy Hauling Lumber to Redmond for Shipment.

(Special to the Bulletin.) SISTERS, Sept. 18.—The Sisters saw mill is now running full handed and there is a crew in the woods cutting logs. Ed. Spoo has purchased a new auto truck that will be used for hauling lumber to Redmond and for hauling logs to the mill. Anthony Roach has been engaged in the same work for some time and it is the intention of Messrs. Roach and Spoo to keep their trucks running night and day. Besides the trucks there are teams engaged in hauling lumber and logs. The Wilson saw mill near here is now running. The entire cut of the mill has been contracted for and it is the intention of the manager, J. O. Wilson, to run steadily until the snow flies if men can be found to work. The mill has had to shut down several times during the season on account of the labor situation.
