COMMERCIAL CLUB VOTES FOR PORTLAND EXHIBIT IN NOVEMBER—NO OUTSIDE SPEAKER PRESENT TODAY.

By a unanimous vote of all members present at the Commercial club luncheon today it was decided to ask the county court to appropriate the \$100 required to finance an exhibit in the State Land Show to be held in Portland in November. Owing to the number of counter attractions today, no speaker was secured for the occasion and the entire discussion was devoted to the exhibit. Judge Barnes read the letter of invitation he had received from Portland and explained the matter. Vernon A. Forbes was called upon for his opinion and stated that he felt that as this has been a prosperous year so far as crops are concerned he felt that Deschutes county should be represented. Accordingly he put the question in the form of a motion.

Another member who spoke in favor of the exhibit was Judge Ellis. "I think that if the county court agrees to give the money, the Commercial club has nothing further to do with the matter," he said. "A member could be selected from each community who would handle the individual exhibits."

If the court takes favorable action Sisters, Tualum and other nearby towns will be asked to assist in preparing the display.

In the absence of H. J. Oversturf, Floyd Dement presided at today's luncheon.

JACK RABBIT WAR TO BEGIN

SHORTAGE OF FEED DRIVES LARGE NUMBERS INTO IRRIGATED VALLEYS—CAUSES DAMAGE TO GRAIN FIELDS.

Owing to shortage of feed on the High Desert and dry land sections of Crook and Deschutes counties, large numbers of jackrabbits are collecting about the ranches in the irrigated valleys and are feeding on the grain fields. County Agriculturalist H. A. Ward has planned the third annual jackrabbit campaign to commence next month.

Cooperating with the county agents, the U. S. Biological Survey conducted a poisoning campaign in Crook county during the last two winters which resulted in killing 125,000 rabbits.

When the work was first undertaken, the rabbit loss to Crook county exceeded \$85,000 annually. That year, 1915, 75,000 rabbits were poisoned by the cooperative community rabbit clubs. The past season, 60,000 jackrabbits were poisoned by the clubs and the annual damage to crops by rabbits totaled less than \$10,000.

The U. S. Bureau of Biological Survey will cooperate in the campaign. County Agriculturalist Ward reports that arrangements have been made with several eastern manufacturing concerns to purchase the rabbit skins. Samples sent in have been reported on as excellent for hat making purposes. The price to be paid will exceed five cents per skin.

STUDENTS TO HAVE EXHIBIT AT REDMOND
Superintendent Thompson Will Give Demonstration of Methods of Potato Selection.

Arrangements have been made with the directors of the Redmond Potato Show to be held on October 5 and 6 for a school industrial exhibit. Thirteen first and second prizes will be offered the boys and the same number to girls making entries. Liberal premiums are promised.

This is in an effort to interest the young people in making regular exhibits. The parents in the Pilot Butte school district have already planned to take their children in automobiles to Redmond on one of the days of the show. They will witness the demonstration given by County School Superintendent Thompson showing the method of selecting potatoes for seed and classifying them for the market.

Notice is hereby given that the following petition praying for the organization of the Central Oregon Irrigation District will be presented to the County Court of Deschutes County, Oregon, at the Court Room in Bend, Oregon, on the 31st day of October, 1917.

to the Honorable County Court of Deschutes County, Oregon:
Under and pursuant to Chapter 357 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1917, the undersigned propose the organization of an Irrigation District to be known as the Central Oregon Irrigation District, and particularly bounded and described as follows:
