**HOOVER WEEK.**

The patriotic feelings engendered by the Liberty Loan campaign ought to go far toward carrying food conservation week to a successful conclusion. We need a stirring up, a galvanizing action, something to make us remember daily that we are at war, and possibly the effort to sell the bonds waked us up enough to realize that this week's war-time effort is worthy of every aid.

It is worthy of aid. Mighty as our army may become, tremendous as may be our financial resources, they are nothing if we and our allies have insufficient food. Starvation has been fighting for the allies in Germany ever since they began to blockade the central empires; the whole point of the German submarine campaign has been the starvation of Great Britain. If the war lasts long enough we may come to the same situation ourselves. Indeed today the country faces a sugar famine, for the relief of which we are called upon to exercise unusual restraint in the use of sweets.

Except for this sugar famine, which is explained to be temporary, America today sees no immediate prospect of food shortage so far as she herself is concerned. And it is not on her account that we are asked to be careful. It is for our allies. Everything we save will go into a surplus for them. Wheat, meats and sweets must be saved for them and households all over the country are now being asked to volunteer in the cooperative work.

Bend will do her share. Our boys at the front will know that we will help them with food as well as with money.

## COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

The regular session of the county court of Deschutes county, Oregon, met in the council room in the O'Kane building, at 10:00 a. m., October 3, 1917.

The meeting was called to order by the County Judge, whereupon it was found that the following members were present:

The first item of business coming up for consideration was the purchase of culvert forms, and after due discussion, it was

Ordered that another set of Whelan culvert forms be purchased from Howard-Cooper Corporation, Portland, at \$350, f. o. b. Portland.

A petition was presented by A. O. Walker, of Alfalfa, and others, for a county road. Petition was accompanied by bond executed by Curt Miller and Paul Mertsching. Same was read and referred to District Attorney De Armond for his approval.

Convention of Oregon County Judges and Commissioners:

In the matter of the convention of the Oregon State association of County Judges and County Commissioners, and the dues connected therewith.

Ordered that \$10, the dues of the association, be forwarded to Philo Holbrook, secretary, and that the invitation to attend the convention December 11, 1917, be accepted.

Ordered that stationery and stamped envelopes be ordered by the County Judge and Commissioners.

No further business coming up for consideration, court adjourned to meet Monday, October 8, 1917, at 10 a. m.

Bend, Oregon, October 8, 1917.—The county court met in the County Judge's office in the Court House this date, pursuant to adjournment, County Judge Barnes, Commissioner Smith, Clerk and Sheriff being present. The meeting was called to order by the County Judge at 10:00 a. m.

In the matter of repairs to the main Redmond-Bend road, through Deschutes, in road districts No. 19 and 16, Supervisor Anton Ahlstrom of Road District No. 19, appeared before the court and reported what improvements are necessary to make this road passable.

After discussion it was ordered that

\$200 be appropriated to make said improvements, with the understanding that as much donation work as possible be furnished by the residents in the district.

Memorandum of sale from Wentworth & Irwin for the G. M. C. truck purchased by the county, was presented, stipulating a price of \$4350, of which \$1000 shall be paid in cash. The memorandum of sale was approved and it was ordered that a warrant for \$1000 be mailed to Wentworth & Irwin.

In the matter of payment of money for premiums on exhibition at the Tumalo Fair, as heretofore ordered, a statement being now presented by the Secretary of said Fair Association, setting forth the premiums paid according to the terms of said order, the total of said premiums amounting to \$295.75, it is now

Ordered that a warrant for \$295.75 be issued, payable to Fred N. Wallace, secretary, and forwarded to him.

The appointment by County Surveyor Geo. S. Young of F. H. May as his deputy, was presented and approved by the court.

The matter of claims against the county coming up for consideration, it was ordered that claims numbered 832 to 924, as shown on pages 30 and 31 of the docket of claims be and the same are hereby allowed, and the clerk is instructed to issue his warrants in payment thereof.

No further business coming up for consideration, court adjourned, to meet October 17, 1917, at 10:00 a. m.

"Under the provisions of an Act of Congress approved October 6, 1917, entitled an act to prohibit the manufacture, distribution, storage, use and possession in time of war of explosives, providing regulations for the safe manufacture, distribution, storage, use and possession of the same, and for other purposes, we are required to publish:

"That from and after 40 days after the approval of such act no person shall have in his possession, or purchase, accept, receive, sell, give, barter and dispose of, or procure ex-

plodes or ingredients except as provided in this act.

"The act further provides that applications for licenses shall be made to such officers of the state as may be designated by the Bureau of Mines. You will, therefore, please call attention in your columns to the fact that this office has been designated to receive such applications on and after November 15, 1917, the date when the act becomes effective, and that the act refers to all explosives, including ammonitions for fire arms.

"Also please call attention to the penalty for the violation of this act, which is not more than \$5000, or imprisonment not exceeding one year.
