## COUNTY COURT DEFERS ACTION

WILL PASS ON PETITION NEXT WEEK.

No Objection Raised at Meeting This Morning—Additional Time Needed For Filing Applications For Admission.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

Action on the petition asking that a date be set for the election, at which the creation of an irrigation district by the settlers on the C. O. I. project will be decided, has been deferred by the county court until next Wednesday. There was no opposition to the formal introduction of the petition at this morning's meeting of the court but it was deemed advisable to take a week to get the situation adjusted owing to the size of the project and the complicated area involved.

The additional time allowed will be for the purpose of getting in touch with any person who has a grievance to present or who desires to come into the district. Applications for this privilege must be filed by next week.

C. H. Irvin, of Redmond, was the only rancher who discussed the matter in court this morning. He owns a section of land which does not come within the present district and which has been watered the past two months by a private ditch. He asked that his place be included in the district. County Surveyor George S. Young explained that the land has not been placed in the area as it was not under water at the time the map was made.

J. J. Ellinger, of Terrebonne, also spoke, advocating including all watered lands such as Mr. Irvin's in the district.
