FREE SEED SCARCER SAYS N. J. SINNOTT

Congressman N. J. Sinnott has written The Bulletin that he has been informed by the Bureau of Plant Industry at Washington that the allotment of vegetable and flower seeds made to each member of the house of representatives for distribution in his district will be 5000 packages fewer this year than it was last year. For this reason he is even more anxious than usual to get the seeds allowed him into the hands of those who will use them to the best advantage and desire to receive the same. The congressman believes that the method tried last year of making the distribution through co-operation with the papers in his district is the most successful in bringing about this result.

Therefore, when the seeds are ready for distribution, which will not be probably until January or later, a supply will be sent to this paper. At that time a package may be obtained as long as they last, either by calling at our office or requesting a package by mail. Congressman Sinnott will also retain a small part of his allotment at his office, 242 House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., in order that any of his constituents finding it inconvenient to get the seeds in the above manner may obtain a package by writing directly to him at Washington.
