

Wilhelm Accepts Throne of Hell From Satan's Hands

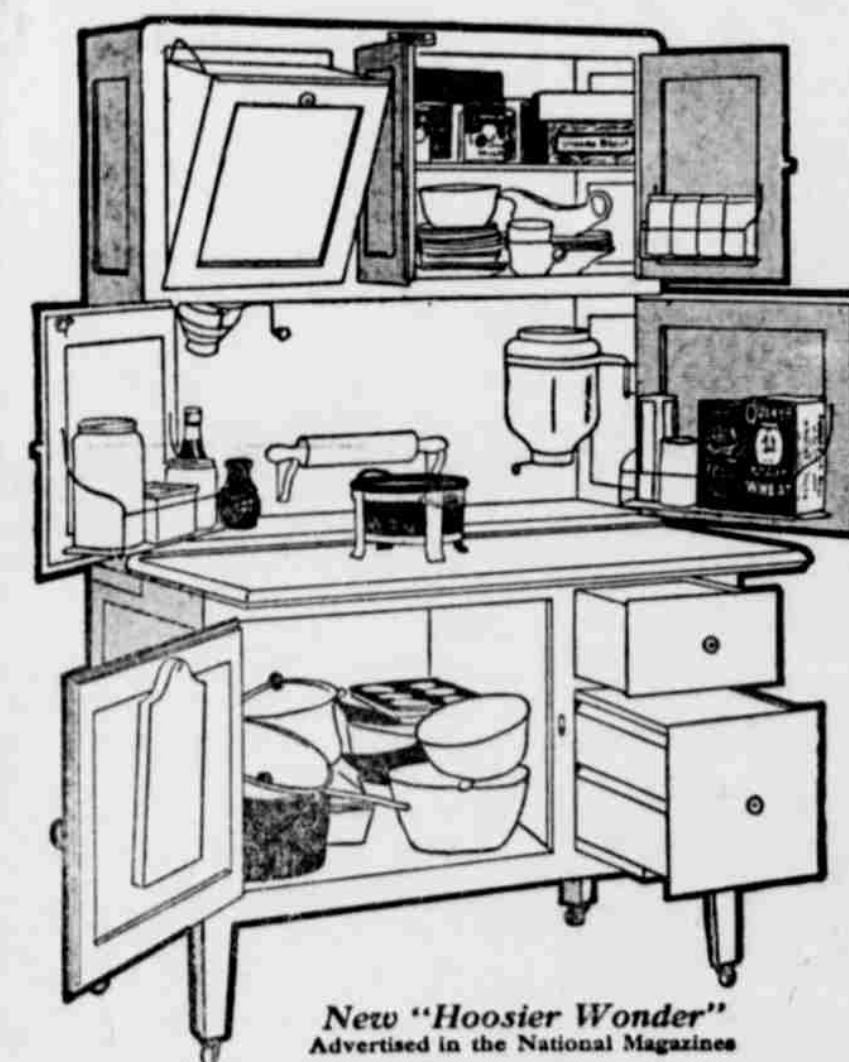

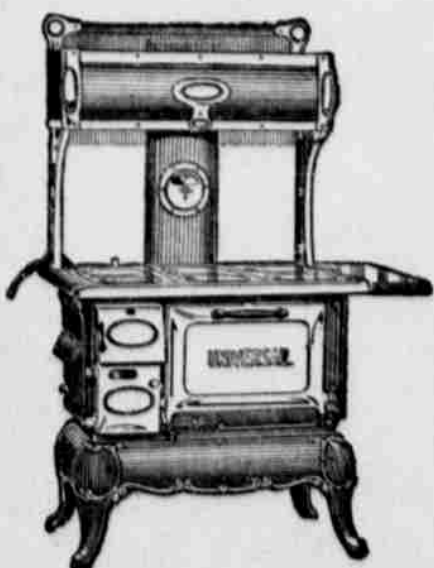
